

Italian Atrocities.

First reports received of the brutality shown by the Italians to helpless Arab prisoners were inclined to be discredited, or, at any rate, considered as highly colored, by correspondents sympathetic with the Turkish cause. but confirmation comes from such reliable sources that there is no longer reason to doubt that a dark blot has been cast upon the arms of a Christian nation. Ontario's Succession Duties.

When Mr. I. B. McLeod, the assistant Provincial Treasurer, closed his books at the end of Ortober the Succession Duties account showed a total of exactly \$1,048,
