Italian Atrocities.

First reports received of the brutality shown by the Italians to helpless Arab prisoners were inclined to be discredited, or, at any rate, considered as highly colored, by correspondents sympathetic with the Turkish cause, but confirmation comes from such reliable sources that there is no longer reason to doubt that a dark blot has been cast upon the arms of a Christian nation. The Italian premier recently issued a statement in which the reports of inhumanity were styled as infamous and the attitude of the soldiery highly lauded, but the reiterated reports of neutral correspondents from England, Germany and France, must be accepted as conclusive. Such scenes as are graphically depicted in the late cables have seemed to awaken world-wide interest in the squabble over Tripoli, which previously its importance did not command, and the effects may be far-reaching. They will also tend to swing the pendulum of sympathy toward the Turks and their desert allies.

Ontario's Succession Duties.

When Mr. I. B. McLeod, the assistant Provincial Treasurer, closed his books at the end of October the Succession Duties account showed a total of exactly \$1,043,248.94; an increase of \$59,802 over the figures for last year.

October being the final month of the financial year of the Province, generally contributes a very large amount to the succession duties total. The past month however fell below the corresponding period last year, the total being \$93,249, as compared to \$154,693 in October, 1910. The largest single payment last month came from the estate of the late John Meikle, of Morisburg.

Not in the Book.

A German Allegory.

On a recent trip to Germany Doctor Harvey Wiley, the Government's pure food expert, heard an allegory with reference to the subject of food adulteration which, he contends, should cause Americans to congratulate themselves that things are so well ordered in this respect in the United States.

Guarding London's Treasures.

London's art treasures are most jealously protected. The National Gallery, in addition to having a secret system of alarms, is patrolled day and night by twenty-two constables and twenty-five employees. At the British Museum the million of pounds' worth of treasures are protected by over 200 assistants, including eight keepers of departments, fifty-three assistants, nine second division clerks, twenty-two chief attendants, ninety-six attendants, five boy clerks, twenty-three boy attendants, forty-three commissionaires and fifty-one laborers, while a number of detectives in various disguises keep an eagle eye on things in general.—London Telegraph.

Shifting Ministers.

One of Wesley's reasons for shifting his preachers every three years was avowedly that they might be able to preach the same sermon over again in different congregations. He knew by experience the difficulty of sermon making. After a few weeks, he said, a preacher cannot find matter for preaching every morning and evening, "nor does the people come to hear him, unless as if he never stays more than a fortnight in one place he will find plenty of matter, and the people will hear him gladly. I know that were I to preach one whole year in one place I should preach both myself and my congregation to sleep."—London Chronicle.
