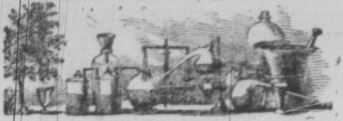
THE TRAINING SCHOOL in this City, esta-

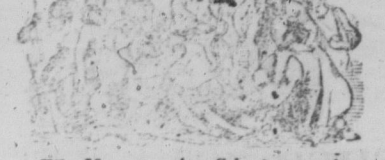
