## THIS PLUM IS HIGHLY RECOMMENDED

Owing to the fact that this plum has been introduced into Canada only recently, THE CANADIAN HORTICULTURIST is unable to state how it will succeed in this climate, for as yet it has not been tested by any of the Canadian experiment stations. There is a possibility that it may be tender for some sections of Canada, unless planted in a sheltered position. The firm of Stone & Wellington, however, does not believe this to be the case, as in their nurseries the Maynard Plum, during the past two winters, which have been exceptionally cold, has come through in perfect condition. Other varieties, which heretofore have been considered perfectly hardy, were frozen back. It is, therefore, they believe, evident that the Maynard is a first-class plum for Canada. The reports from those people who have planted this tree in Canada, and from experiment stations in the United States, speak very highly of this plum.

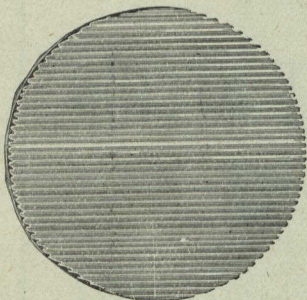

## FRUIT THAT IS WORTH PICKING NEEDS TO BE PROPERLY PACKED



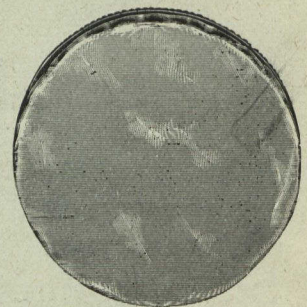
Corrugated Cap

Fruit should not be packed without using a

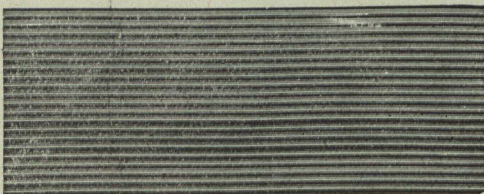

as it protects the face of the barrel or box, making it show up free from flattened ends or stem punctures, each apple being as perfect as when placed.

Such packages bring more money, every apple being saleable, which is not the case when pressure is forced on the bare fruit. In not having bruised fruit you avoid rot. Orchard Cushion



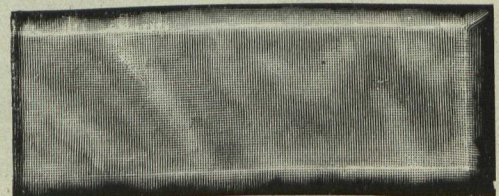
Corrugated Box Cap
