Prople, Language. — The Nestorana are not so much a nation no a sect. Among inemestics shey do no go by the name of Nestorana, but of Christans. As a sect they rose in the fifth century, in consequence of the eccommencement of Nestorius, the Baloup of Constantonple, who bad received his birth and education in Syra, and who was deposed, probably, more out of eavy than because of heresy.
