## MONTREAL PRODUCE MARKET.

LOUR.-A fair demand has generally prevailed, and. with restricted

and, with restricted receipts, the tendency has been for the most part upwards. The operations of the week have mostly been in superfines, on Quebec and Lower Port account, which, added to a fair local inquiry, has kent the market pretty have of the better descriptions, the market closing firm at the advance established, though with less disposition on the part of buyers to continue operations at the enhanced rates demanded. We quote ordinary super \$7.30 to \$7.40, and strictly choice and strong \$7.40 to \$7.45. \$7.50, and in some cases more, is demanded by holders of a few favorite brands, but only secured in exceptional cases. Extras and Fancies continue dull and comparatively neglected, transactions being for the most part confined to small broken parcels. Good No. 2 and Fine meet a free sale at full rates. Other kinds are little in favor, though offered relatively low Bag Flour .-- The supply throughout has been in excess of the demand, and, although some improvement may be noted, relatively low rates still rule. We quote \$3.80 to \$3.90 as closing rates for choice and strong, and \$8.75 to \$3.80 for ordinary.

OATMEAL .-- The supply begins to exceed the demand, and some decline in price has taken place. \$4.90 to \$5 may be considered the value of strictly good exportable samples, but some of what is offered, being of inferior make and flavour, is, for the time being, quite neglected.

WHEAT-Arrivals are small, and within the requirements of the local and neighboring millers, who are readily taking all that offers at about \$1.50 per bushel ex-cars in store. Prime samples would now command \$1.523.

PEASE-Continue to command a fair degree of attention, and all that arrives finds ready sale at from 90 to 95c. per 66 lbs., according to quality, condition, Sec.

BARLEY-Of good color and quality, fit for malting is in demand for export to Britain. Inferior and grinding kinds are dull and inactive, at lower prices. OATS-Are not much enquired for.

PORK-Has been gradually declining during the week, and holders are now anxious to quit themselves of their stocks before new comes forward, as it is probable a much lower range of prices than lately current will rule next season.

BUTTER .-- The demand has entirely fallen off, and sales of ordinary are no longer possible at any price that holders appear willing to accept The returns of shipments made to Britain continue unsatisfactory and unprofitable to the shippers, and most have, in consequence, retired from the market. Navigation is now nearly closed, and with the sailing of the last steamer it is probable, in order to tempt shipments, a very low range of prices will have to be submitted to. ASIES.—Pots are very dull, and prices are almost nominal, at about \$6.25 for first's. Inferiors unsale-able. *Pearls* are in better demand, stocks and receipts being light.

## MONEY MARKET.

THE money market has been growing easier, and good business paper is readily discounted at 7 per cent. Sterling Exchange, which ruled firm during the early part of the week at 1091 to 1091 for Bank 60-day drafts on London, was easier at the close at a slight decline, 1091 to 1093 being the latest cash quotations. The same rates raled yesterday in New York. Gold draits on New York are abundant, and selling at i to discount. There have been sales of large amounts at the latter figure.

GOLD in New York advanced somewhat towards the end of last week and beginning of this, touching 148}, but has been affected by the success of the Republican party in the elections which took place on Tuesday last, and yesterday receded to 1461, at which it stood at latest reports.

SILVER is in fair supply, at unchanged rates, buying at 33 and selling at 31 per cent discount.

# A New Bank.

The prospectus of a new bank about to be started under the name of "The Waterloo County Bank," has been issued. The head office will be in Galt, C. W., and the proposed capital will be \$2,000,0.0, in 80,000 shares of \$25 each. A charter is to be applied for at the next session, and the bank is to go into operation as soon as \$400,000 shall have been subscribed, and \$100,000 paid in. The prospectus, amongst other things, states that interest will be allowed on current accounts. Several of the leading manufac turers and wealthy gentlemen of Galt and vicinity are prime movers in the matter, and it is probable it will be brought to a successful issue.
