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others. The result is that the business on spot is small and prices are hard to fix but it appears that 1110. to 1113. is about the idea. We do not hear of much more cold storage choose moving and are given to understand that a good proportion of it is being held for shipment in January and February.

There is some enquiry in this connection for summer cheese from across the water but holders are not offering at present.

CHEKN FRUIT.—The bulk of the trade is over and acrivals by steamers from Boston are becoming quite small. Apples are in comparatively small receipt as the larger portion of this season's crop is being hold for shipment later on when prices are expected to be better than they now are, as in Great believe and on the Continent the wield has been for below the average. Britain and on the Continent the yield has been far below the average. Oranges are higher but the demand is still light. There is a fair enquiry for lomons at advanced prices.

Bunans continue to occupy but little attention.

Tomatoes are good sellers. Watermelous are now practically out of the market. Cranberries are in good supply from Cape Cod.

DRIED FRUIT.—There is not much doing in Valencia raisins nor is there

likely to be until the arrival of fruit by direct shipments. Sultana raisine continue quiet and the little enquiry there is principally for fine. Malaga raising are not as jet in much demand and sales are chiefly confined to connoiseurs at \$3.25 to \$3.75 and Lindon buyers at \$2.50 to \$2.75. Samples of new season's currents have come to hand. The fruit is of good quality—better than last year's crop. The demand for this fruit, especially of the better grades, property to be brisk. Old fruit is pretty-well cleaned out and what little is left is selling very low to make room for the expected

new crop.

Sugars.—The local demand for sugar continues to be still very active, but business in this line begins to show signs of slackening off. The enquiry now is principally for small lote. The supply has improved, the refiners having overtaken the demand. Stocks are, however, as yet light. Willott & Gray of New York in their Weekly Statistical say:—"Raws and refined are unchanged. Total stock in all the principal countries 438,669 tons against 453,401 tons at same date last year. Affects to the United States from all countries estimated 89,000 tons against 116,000 tons last year. Beet sugar quotation, cost and freight, 14. 3d. per cwt. for first." The business of the week in raws has been limited to small dealings in Centrifugal sugars for the Canadian market at 3\(\frac{7}{2}\): for 96° test. No Muscavados have been sold with the exception of a cargo of Brazils. The almost entire absence of stocks in importers' hands is the cause of the small local business. Receipts have been 26,418 tons and the melting 35,000 tons, and stocks have declined 8,582 tons to 41,669 tons, which are almost all in refiners' hands. While local quotations are unchanged and unchangable till sugars begin to arrive, to importers it is a noticeable feature that we have passed over from one sugar campaign to another commencing Oct. 1 and that the sugar of the new crops available for shipment can be bought at ic. per lb. lower than the present local quotations. The sugar world enters the new campaign with comparatively small stocks in hand and a bare sufficiency of supplies in sight for the present month's requirements. After this month, however, there promises to to be available for the 12 months a best crop of about the same size as last year and cane crops that may exceed those of last year by, possibly, 300,000 tons. On the other hand from unusual causes the consumption of sugar this year has been kept at the lowest possible limit (being in the United States scarcely larger than last year, to that the coming year should require the natural increase of two years in consumption or say 10 per cent. increase (200,000) for the United States alone unless the result is interfered with by a government tax on the consumer through a sugar tax which is now threatened."

-The tea market is quiet and dull. Buyers are holding off, being apparently afraid to buy, owing to the fact that cable offers are coming in hand which are lower than the price paid for goods now en route. brokers report prospects favorable for a fair business in all kinds of teas. Young Hysons are scarce and dealers find it difficult to obtain a fair assortment of samples. Japans continuo strong and sellers have been better able to obtain their ideas.

COFFEE.—There is not much change in this market. Stocks of Rio coffee in the local market are practically exhausted and it is not known when they can be replenished on account of the revolution in Brazil. The one or two houses that have any Rio coffee are holding it for their retail customers. If the coffee was on hand a good trade could be done in it. On account of the scarcity of the Rio article that of Samos is receiving more attention than usual and it is also now getting scarce.

Figur.—The local fish market continues dull and inactive. Receipts and shipments are small relatively, and there is absolutely no life or activity about the business. Inclement weather and scarcity of but at most points render it difficult, in fact nearly impossible, for fishermen along our shores to prosecute their avocations with any success. The Montreal fish market is quiet—pickled, smoked and dried fish meeting with a fair demand. Quotations are .—Portland innan haddies 7½c. to 8½c.; St. John bloaters \$1.50; kippered herring \$1.75 per box; green cod \$5.25 to \$5.50 per Lbl.; large No. 2 mackerel, half bbls., \$8.50; Labrador salmon \$12 to \$14 per bbl.; C. B. herring \$5.50; Labrador do. \$5. At Boston the receipts from the mackerel fleet have been light during the week and the market, though still could be a salmon \$1.50. quiet, is firmer. Fresh mackerel have also been in lighter supply and prices have advanced. At Gloucester the receipts have been moderate during the past week except in mackerel which have been fair for the season, and fresh halibut which have been in very light supply. The market is buoyant and there will be no stocks of consequence to carry over to another season.


