

brand Valencia raisins, says: "First shipment made, prices forty per cent. less than last year." Currants—Barff & Co., Patras, wrote on July 31st:—"There have been some complaints lately of damage by rot, but we do not think the damage till now is of any consequence; should it continue, however, it may make con-siderable damage to quality. Quantity in any case will be large, unless something unexpect-ed occurs. Shipments about August 26th; outting only commenced to day." Advices about prunes are favorable as regards quality and quantity of the Bosnia crop; quotations are moderate, but no low prices are anticipat-ed. Malaga—the cutting of the fruit will begin about August 20th; shipments in bulk may be expected about the end of September. The raisin crop is expected to yield 500,000 boxes; so far the quality of the grapes is fair. Coffees are wery firm in price, but dull; syrup and molasses, quiet and easy. Sugars, granulated are now in normal supply, and prices are weaker; yellow sugars have receded one-eighth cent per lb. Teas are quiet and without move-ment; the first arrival of young Hysons ex SS. "Parthia," is announced, prices about the same as last year; quality is not ascertained as yet, bulk not being broken. Another five cents per pint has been added to the price of imported ales and porter. According to a cable to Perkins, Ince & Co., the first ship-ment of Valencia raisins to this market was made from Denia on the 19th instant. Straw is scarce and dearer, selling readily at \$10 to 10.25 per ton.
