## WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The regular monthly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. John's schoolhouse, December 29th. Twenty-six ladies present. The meeting was opened with a hymn, followed by the Missionary Litany: special prayers for the diocese of Ottawa and Corea. The treasurer reported the receipt of \$68.47 during the month. A letter was read from the diocesan treasurer asking for contributions for Onion Lake, for Miss Paterson's work at Matsumoto, Japan, and an increase of ten dollars for Miss Smith, of Nagano. It was agreed to contribute the amount required for Onion Lake and Miss Smith. Letter from Rev. G. Rogers, Winnipeg, thanking the members of the Auxiliary for assisting in collecting the "three years' card" money for Rupert's Land Home Missions. The total amount subscribed in St. Alban's, St. John's, and St. George's parishes was \$928, of which \$730.15 was collected and forwarded to Mr. Rogers. The Dorcas secretary read most interesting letters from Rev. John Badger, acknowledging surplice, cassock, and stole, sent by the Ottawa Auxiliary. Bales were acknowledged from the incumbents of Cache Bay, Goulais Bay, Algoma diocese, as well as from Mr. King, who is superintendent of the Shingwauk Home. Eight new members were reported in Christ Church parish, and two in St. George's. Interesting reports were read of the work in Ottawa diocese—the formation of a Clerical Guild was held at Rev. A. W. Mac-
