The answer given by the minister was as follows:

Mr. Speaker, I think I can answer this very briefly. On June 1 our ambassador in Washington did sign on behalf of the government of Canada a protocol extending the administrative articles of the 1962 wheat agreement until July 31, 1968, with provision for earlier termination in the event of a new agreement covering wheat—

I would ask the minister to explain what he means by those two answers.

Mr. Winters: Mr. Speaker-

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I doubt whether the minister would insist on replying to the argument raised by the hon. member for Bow River. This is obviously not a question of privilege; it is a form of argument which might be raised when this debate is before the house. I suggest that the matter be allowed to rest there until the minister has been given an opportunity to make a statement.

Mr. Winters: Mr. Speaker, I think I should rise on a question of privilege, if I may, to clear that very point. While the framework of the international agreement was continued by that protocol, I made it clear at the same time that this did not apply to the price structure because we in Canada did not agree to a continuation of that low price structure.

Some hon. Members: Oh, oh.

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. I suggest that all these questions of privilege might be considered tomorrow.
