FALKLAND ISLANDS—CONDEMNATION OF ARGENTINE

Munro (Esquimalt-Saanich): Madam Speaker, now that the Secretary of State for External Affairs (Mr. MacGuigan) in an interview in Windsor, Ontario, characterized the use of force by Argentina in the Falkland as aggressive, and the Secretary of State (Mr. Regan) in a speech in Windsor, Nova Scotia, is reported as characterizing the Argentinian action in that area as naked aggression, it is just possible that I can count on unanimous consent on this occasion to my motion under Standing Order 43. I therefore move, seconded by the hon. member for Cariboo-Chilcotin (Mr. Greenaway):

That this House condemns the Argentine government for failing to respond to the demand in the UN resolution of April 3 that all Argentinian forces be withdrawn from the Falkland Islands, and urges the government of that country to respond positively now to that UN resolution so as to avoid further needless

conflict and loss of life, and commends the Royal Naval Task Force for the judicious manner in which it is pursuing its objective in persuading the aggressor to withdraw its troops from the Falkland, and meanwhile urges both parties to make every effort to find a solution to the problem that will recognize the legitimate aspirations of the inhabitants of the Falkland Islands.

At a recent rally in Burnaby, over 500 people called for the closing of Oakalla prison and the honouring of the many promises by previous provincial governments to close this archaic institution in the near future. In view of the fact that the federal Solicitor General (Mr. Kaplan) has stated that he is seriously considering co-operating with the Social Credit provincial government to build a new maximum security prison for women on the Oakalla lands, despite the opposition of Burnaby municipal council and local MLAs, including James Lorimer, local MLA for Burnaby-Willington, I move, seconded by the hon. member for Winnipeg-Birds Hill (Mr. Blaikie):

That this House make very clear to the Solicitor General that under no circumstances will the people of Burnaby agree to any new prison facility being located in that community and instead that they seek an early closing of the entire Oakalla prison.
