Oral Questions

It is vital that the energy-based industries in western Canada and off the coast of Newfoundland and Labrador be given an opportunity to become the engines of growth, of job creation, that we know they can. IMPACT ON FAMILIES

THE BUDGET

TRANSPORT DEPARTMENT'S ANALYSIS

Hon. Lloyd Axworthy (Winnipeg-Fort Garry): Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask a question of the Minister of Transport before he leaves the sinking ship and goes off to greener

pastures in Alberta. The Prime Minister has indicated that the Budget will have a wonderful job-creation impact, yet a report prepared by the Minister's own Department, the Economic Analysis Section of the Policy Co-ordination Unit, has said that the federal Budget of May 23 is assessed by the Economic Analysis Unit as having the potential to slow down economic growth and will provide little stimulus to transportation activities. Further, it says that there is an expected loss in 1986 of 20,000 to 50,000 jobs.

Does the Minister of Transport agree with the assessment that was prepared by his own economic forecasters? Has he shared this assessment with the Minister of Finance? Does he stand by the figures prepared by his own Department which predict that the Budget will, in fact, have the effect of a direct job loss for Canadians, contrary to what the Minister of Finance and the Prime Minister have been saying?

Hon. Don Mazankowski (Minister of Transport): Mr. Speaker, I am surprised that the Hon. Member would fail to acknowledge the fact that there have been 271,000 new jobs created since this Government took office.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Mazankowski: That fact is contrary to the speculation that was made by the Hon. Member, by the leader of his Party, and indeed by the Leader of the New Democratic Party. I suggest that the comments he is trying to read into the record are of a similar nature.

MINISTER'S POSITION

Hon. Lloyd Axworthy (Winnipeg-Fort Garry): Mr. Speaker, I find it curious that the Minister of Transport is now denying the forecasts made by officials of his own Department. This is not speculation, it is hard figures and forecasts made by senior officials of his Department who go on to say that, in fact, there will be a major—

He had his own views on certain aspects of transportation policy contrary to the views of his own departmental officials.
