Adjournment Debate NATIONAL DEFENCE

Mr. Jesse Flis (Parkdale—High Park): Mr. Speaker, on April 26, I posed a question to the Acting Prime Minister in the absence of the Secretary of State for External Affairs for the Minister of National Defence.

I asked about the crisis in Srebrenica where 150 Canadians soldiers have put their lives on the line as UN peacekeepers. They have found themselves in a very dangerous situation because the government did not take the advice of the opposition about holding a full parliamentary debate about the nature of the mandate of our peacekeeping troops in light of the changing role of the United Nations and in light of our role changing from a peacekeeping nation to a peace-making nation.

We know that Britain and France refused to send any additional soldiers. We know that additional Canadian soldiers were stopped by the Serb soldiers so they could not come.

I am pleased that today another peace pact has been signed. I hope that all three parties will live up to this new peace agreement. We have had so many signed before but never honoured. It is one thing to sign the peace agreements but it is another thing to honour them.

I hope that the minister is here today because the critic for the Liberal Party asked in Question Period today: "Madam minister, what is the mandate of our Canadian peacekeeping troops?" He also offered a full parliamentary debate on this issue to the government side. As late as today we still do not know what is the role of our peacekeepers. Is it to shoot in self-defence? Is it to protect the inhabitants of Srebrenica from whom all guns were taken and they are left there like sitting ducks?

I agree with the guns being taken away, but I think guns should have been taken away from both sides. Usually in peacekeeping, all arms are taken away from both sides.
