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SHORTS ON CORN  
IN TIGHT CORNERCovering Purchases Gave  
Strength to Quotations—  
December Wheat Strong.

CHICAGO, Dec. 31.—The squeezing of shorts brought about a decided advance today in the price of wheat and corn. Attempts to force on the bull leader several million bushels of corn that arrived too late to be unloaded at elevators met with failure. Closing quotations, which were steady at nearly the top level of the day, showed net gains as follows: Wheat, 3-5c to 21-2c; corn, 1-3c to 11-4c; oats, 1-3c to 3-8c, and provisions, 71-2c to 35c.

Wheat had a remarkable advance for December notwithstanding that last Thursday's deliveries on contracts for the month amounted to nearly a round million bushels. It was not until the final hour of the session that the upturn in wheat developed excitement among shorts.

The action of the directors of the board of trade spoiled the plans of the dealers who had hoped for an emergency rule that would allow the delivery of related corn on alternative but to settle as quietly and as soon as possible. The long exhibited no disposition to lift prices to a sensational figure, but seemed content to supply all comers who were willing to accept what the bull leaders thought reasonable after a hard fought battle.

Oats sympathized with the strength of wheat and corn.

Aggressive buying lifted provisions. Grain traders and stockyard speculators were responsible.
