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SHORTS ON CORN IN TIGHT CORNER Purchases Gave Covering Strength to Quotations-December Wheat Strong.

CHICK GO, Dec. 31.—The squeezing of short brought about a decided ad-vance today in the price of wheat and corn. Attempts to force on the bull leader several million bushels of corn that arrived too late to be unloaded at elevators met with failure. Closing quotations, which were steady at near-ly the top level of the Cay, showed net gains as follows: Wheat, 3-8c to 21-2c: corn, 1-8c to 11-4c; oats, 1-8c to 3-8c, and provisions, 71-2c to 35c.
