"All who are now present, and have witnessed this Trial, as well as the crews of others of His Majesty's ships, must be convinced of the heinous crime of desertion; more particularly so, when it is attended with mutinous and contemptuous behaviour to your Officers. The fate of the unfortunate prisoner will, I trust, fink deep into your minds, and prevent the continuance of an offence so hurtful to your country, and disgraceful to the character of British Seamen."

On Monday morning last, at a quarter past nine o'clock, the sentence of the Court Martial was carried into effect at the fore-yard arm of His Majesty's Sloop of War, Halifax.
