CIVIC CONSPIRACY CASES.
 One Withdrawn and Two Are Fur-
 ther Adjudged.

Yesterday, in the police court, the
 civic conspiracy cases were again taken
 up and the vent pipe contract investi-
 gation was continued.

This involved the Bennett &
 Wright Co., Asa Mathews, Alex. E.
 Wheeler and the Metallic Roofing Co.
 The case against the Douglas Bros.,
 who did the work, testified that Ben-
 nett & Wright and the Metallic Roofing
 Co. each got \$200 and Wheeler & Bain
 and Mathews \$250 each.

An adjournment was made until this
 morning.

At the request of Crown Attorney
 Drayton, the charges against E. J. Len-
 nox, Joseph Wright, and Samuel W.
 Clark were withdrawn, owing to the
 continued absence of the latter.

The case against the Metallic Roof-
 ing, Shingle and Siding Co. was ad-
 judged for a week.

**FRANKLIN ON GOOD AND BAD

 know that Benjamin Franklin was also
 a spelling reformer, as the following
 letter shows:

To Mrs. Jane Mecom, on Good and Bad
 Spelling.

You need not be concerned in writ-
 ing to me about your bad spelling; for
 in my opinion, as our alphabet now
 stands, the bad spelling, or what is
 called so, is generally the best, as con-
 forming to the sound of the letters
 and of the words. To give you an in-
 stance: A gentleman received a letter
 in which were these words: "Cot find-
 ing Brown at hom. I delivered your
 mesag to his yr." The gentleman find-
 ing it bad spelling, and therefore not
 very intelligible, called his lady to help
 him read it. Between them they picked
 out the meaning of all but the yr. for
 which they could not understand. The
 lady proposed calling her chamber-
 maid, because Betty, says she, has the
 best knack at reading bad spelling of
 any one I know. Betty came, and was
 surprised that neither sir nor madam
 could tell what yr was. "Why," says
 she, "yr, spells wife; what else can it
 be?" And indeed, it is a much bet-
 ter, as well as shorter, method of spell-
 ing the wife than doubleyou, & c. e. which
 in reality spells doublewife.

65 LOADS AT UNION YARDS
GENERAL QUALITY NOT GOOD
 Trade Dull With Prices Lower—
 Sheep, Lambs and Calves
 Steady.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock
 Yards were 65 car loads, composed of 1302
 cattle, 44 sheep, 32 calves and 2 horses.
 The quality of fat cattle was not good,
 with the exception of about 6 loads of ship-
 pers and a couple of loads of butchers.
 Trade was slow, in fact the dullest of
 the season on the Junction market.

Exporters.
 Prices ranged as follows: Fat cattle from \$4
 to \$4.65 per cwt.; bulk selling from \$4.30
 to \$4.75 per cwt.; export bulls at \$3.50
 to \$4.00 per cwt. and one or two at \$4.25
 per cwt.

Butchers.
 The quality of butchers' cattle, with the
 exception of one or two loads, was com-
 monplace stuff, selling at low prices; the
 picked lots sold at \$4.50 to \$4.65, few
 selling these prices, mean sold from
 \$3.50 to \$4; common at \$2.75 to \$3.25; can-
 ners at \$1.25 per cwt.

There were several loads of cattle
 brought as exporters that were sold as
 short-keep lots, at \$5.00 each to the con-
 sumer, at \$3.90 to \$4.12, and one choice load
 at \$4.25; distillery feeders sold at \$3.50 to
 \$3.70 for steers, and bulls at \$2.25 to \$2.85
 per cwt.

 the Junction market this season, which sold
 from \$30 to \$63 each.
