Corn and oats were firmer in sympathy with wheat. Shorts covered largely in both and the buying was also good. We expect a further advance in these cereals.

Provisions were somewhat weaker today. We do not anticipate lower prices, and would rather buy than sell them.

McIntyre & Wardwell (John J. Dixon) received the following despatch to-day from their branch office in Chicago:

There is too much rain in Red River valley, and not enough in Kansas and Oklahoma. St. Louis and Kansas City sent numerous telegrams complaining of drought in those States and resultant damages. Chinch bug stories were also in evidence, some from Southern Hilnois. The talent found a market without any selling pressure and immediately began to trade for an advance. St. Louis bought persistently and the damage talk attracted some outside buying. The market ruled very firm and gradually advanced 1½c, closing firm at the best prices of the day. Local traders generally bought and it looks to-night as though their books showed a balance on the long side. The Price Current commented favorably on the growing crop, but said chinch bug talk was increasing. There was nothing interesting in cable news and export demand was again conspicuously absent. Receipts at Minneapolis and Duluth are running considerably lighter; they were aggerated, may cause further advance, but we think the market will soon suffer a sharp downward reaction.
