JUNCTION NOTINGS.

Municipal Committee at Work on Estimates—Other Items. Toronto Junction, July 2.—The Municipal Committee are preparing their estimates for the year. The total estimated for the waterworks is \$600,000, made up as follows: Salaries, \$190,000; cleaning, \$50,000; coal, \$400,000; water services, \$400,000; oil, waste, etc., \$150,000; repairs, \$50,000; waterworks extension, \$50,000; sundries, \$250,000. For the Works Department the total estimate is \$450,000, made up as follows: Sidewalks, \$425,000; salaries, \$100,000; maintenance of sewers, \$250,000; streets, \$400,000; snow shovelling, \$150,000; repairs, \$25,000; sewer drainage, \$15,000. CAN LEPROSY BE CURED?

A Parisian Scientist Makes Some Wonderful Discoveries in a Bacterium. Leprosy is Fatal.

New York, July 2.—A London special to The Sun says: The discovery recently made of a leprosy bacillus, discovered in the streets of Paris has been followed by the announcement that fully a hundred patients from the leprosy disease are at large among the poor of the French capital. Coupled with this news comes the somewhat reassuring statement to the Academy of Sciences, by Dr. Bourne, that he has succeeded in curing severe cases of leprosy. He had been struck with the results obtained by the aid of germs of organic injections in cases of leprosy and proleptis. The doctor sought to modify the condition of the nervous system by strengthening without exciting it, and soon noted the correctness of his concept. He also studied by means of a new technical process the constitution of the blood of leprosy patients, and succeeded in demonstrating the presence of bacillus of leprosy, which had never before been discovered elsewhere than in leprosy tubercles.

CHIEFS IN THE REICHSZAG.

The German Emperor seems to be very popular in the Reichstag to-day. Berlin, July 2.—The Reichstag to-day passed the Ucomargarine bill through the second and third readings. The bill may be obtained, as to whether the Imperial Chancellor, Prince Bismarck, read a message from the Emperor to the Reichstag, and the Emperor's message was a glowing one, praising the diligence and devotion to the arduous task of finishing the civil code. The Reichstag adjourned until July 10.
