Two things led to young Fuler's arrest on suspicion. The first was a remark he made to Johnson French, an employe of the Department of Public Works, on Wednesday morning, to the effect that a woman had been found murdered on Davis-street. The discovery of the body was not made until an hour later. The other reason was the finding of a bangle near the body, which was quickly followed by the statements of several persons that they had seen Fuller wearing such a bangle.

One Suspicion Disposed Of.

But Morgue Attendant Draude testified at the inquest that he himself threw the bangle in the lot when he went there to get the body of the murdered girl. Fuller admits that he was walking the streets all Tuesday night, and was in the vicinity of the place where the girl was found dead. But most everybody thinks it is a mistake to keep the lad in custody any longer. He has been remanded to jail to await further developments.
