Oriental in Vancouver Take a Strange Revenge

Cooks, Domestic and Other
Classes of Labor Go
on Strike.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 10. — The Chinese and Japanese quarters of Vancouver are practically in a stage of siege. Hundreds of revolvers and guns were sold yesterday to Orientals until the police prohibited the sale of firearms. Every Chinese merchant goes about with an armed bodyguard and beside the entrance to every Chinese store stands a Mongolian with a rifle.

All the Chinese cooks, mill men and laborers and all the Japanese working in the city and in the country within a radius of 15 miles from Vancouver have been summoned to the Oriental quarter and are filling all the houses in the quarter. Besides the firearms, knives, stones, bottles and bricks are in stock, ready to repel the attack of a mob at any future occasion.

It is understood that Mayor Bethune has received a telegram from Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada, of Ottawa, demanding that law and order be preserved in Vancouver at all costs, and the lives and property of the Japanese residents be accorded full protection, as guaranteed under the clauses of the treaty between Canada and Japan.

The chief of police has sworn in 100 special constables. The militia will be called out if there are signs of further disturbance.

A Great Revenge.

The revenge of Oriental labor, particularly the strike of cooks, domestics and servants disarranged the menu of fashionable Vancouver homes, hotels and restaurants, even steamers closing a score of restaurants. In many cases guests at hotels were made victims of new and strange diet, while chaos reigned in many homes. Vancouver having practically no female domestics nor cooks.

Vice-President Von Rhein, of the local trades and labor council, and secretary of the local league, who was chairman of Saturday's meeting, has been kept busy denying that the trades and labor council had anything to do with the riot.

Up to a late hour tonight the mayor had not received Premier Laurier's telegram urging the punishment of the offenders, but he is determined this will be done and law and order maintained at all cost. The view is also general here that the Dominion Government and not the city must pay the damage bill, which will be twenty thousand.

A dozen Orientals were arrested for carrying loaded revolvers. This

were arrested by Detectives Rider, Nickles and Egerton yesterday on the charge, on the strength of information wired by a railroad man at Glencoe, who saw the two suspects bump into Mr. Duncanson shortly before he missed his money.

The third man was picked up at the Tecumseh House by the officers, and gives his name as George Reid, and his residence as Windsor. Reid put up a fight when arrested. It is known that the three men arrested were seen together at Windsor recently.

was followed by the discovery of a suspicious 7-foot case shipped here from Westminster to prominent Chinese merchants.

The case contained thirty rifles and five thousand rounds of ammunition. It is now in the custody of the police. The third midnight feature was the sensational discovery of oil-soaked waste in the corner of the Japanese mission schoolhouse. This brought out the fire brigade, and thousands of curious people, with Consul Morikawa appearing at the close demanding more protection. Then he autoed back to the consulate, sending a lengthy cable of the day's events to Tokyo.

Of 23 arrests, 3 were discharged, 15 remanded, and 1 committed for trial. J. A. Pollock, clerk of B. C. Electric Railway Company. His counsel argued that as the riot act had not been read the charge of rioting was technically unsupportable. The magistrate held the reading of the act did not make a riot. During evidence Pollock convulsed the court by contending that he threw no stones, being arrested while the stone was yet in his hand. He has been a resident eighteen years. Opposite the name of nearly all the others was written no fixed occupation or address. Two are Jap fishermen. It is likely the remaining eighteen will be committed for trial in the October assizes.

The city council at a special meeting took action to prevent a wrestling contest on Thursday for the championship of the world in jiu-jitsu, fearing that if Scott McLaglen should defeat Professor Kanada, the present Japanese champion of the world, it might lead to a violent scene. It is also intended to prevent the meeting called for Thursday of the Anti-Asiatic League, whose parade has disgraced the city.

IS ROASTED BY AYLESWORTH

The Liberals of Ottawa over the taking of Mr. Graham to a larger sphere. We wish Mr. Graham success in his new field, and knowing him as we do we have every confidence that when he goes to Ottawa he will make good there as he "made good" in Ontario. Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, who was received with great cordiality, began with a tribute to Hon. G. P. Graham, from whom he bore a message expressing his keen disappointment at not being able to visit Dundas. Mr. Aylesworth thought it was a question of vital interest to the people whether Mr. Borden proposed to make Mr. Foster finance minister or whether he intended to have him in the cabinet at all. Then there was Mr. Geo. W. Fowler and Mr. Rufus Pope. Did Mr. Borden propose to give places to them?

Proceeding to criticize some of the planks of Mr. Borden's platform, Mr. Aylesworth described the "honestest appropriation and expenditure of public moneys in the public interest" as the merest political platitude. Mr. Aylesworth took up the election purity plank, and showed that not only were the points dealt with by Mr. Borden covered by the present election law, but that it was to the Liberals that that law was due. He was afraid, however, that Mr. Borden, however high sounding his phrases were, was not above playing a political game, and in view of what had transpired in connection with Mr. Hugh Graham's contribution of \$30,000 to a campaign fund in Quebec it was no wonder that he now wished to restrict such contributions to others than contractors and the promoters of companies.

Quoting from Mr. Borden's speech on Saturday, he pointed out that it contained an insinuation that Mr. Fielding had connived at corruption in Halifax. "That insinuation," said Mr. Aylesworth, "I hurt back at Mr. Borden's head. Mr. Borden, please, that election petition presented against him was being delayed for political reasons. Mr. Borden knew this was not true, as the last postponement was made by mutual consent. Mr. Aylesworth declared that if that election petition ever came on for trial, and the evidence was given in court, that had been told him, Mr. Borden would be disqualified from holding office, and be banished from the House of Commons for at least eight years.

His agents were guilty of bribery, intimidation and other unfair practices which were freely indulged in to secure Mr. Borden's election, and with his knowledge, if not with his consent.
