Men Connected With Western Federation of Miners Are Blamed.

Baker City, Oregon, Oct. 2.-The western faction of the miners was accused of instigating the death of Harvey K. Brown, formerly sheriff of this county, in an anti-mortem statement made by the victim yesterday after-
