### HOG INCREASE IS BEING URGED ON **ALL PRODUCERS**

"One More Sow," Slogan For Middlsex Farmers To Follow.

NO FIXED PRICES BAR

Means Handicap, But Men Will Do Best They Can, They Say.

At a largely attended and representa ive meeting of the hog-raisers of Middlesex, held Friday afternoon at the Tecumseh . House, it was decided to preach the gospel of more hog-raising in the various townships of the county, by having the men go back home and gather in their friends and neighbors for a conference and explain to them that the world was facing a shortage of fats and that it was up to the farmers to do their best to alleviate this shortage, which was a very real one. As District Representative R. A. Finn explained to the men, "If we don't raise

hogs and keep up the supply of fats needed by the Allies we lose all." He UNUSUALLY GOOD

needed by the Allies we lose all." He admitted that it would be no easy matter to convince the farmers of this, as the food controller had not seen fit to put a minimum price on the porkers.

Wade Toole, editor of the Farmers' Advocate, who attended the conference at Ottawa and Toronto relative to the hog situation, states that he had no intention of advising the farmers what to do, as the tillers of the soil had been fed up on it, but it was necessary for them to grasp the situation properly. In his opinion there should be a good demand for all the hogs produced. He that the campaign had been late in getting started, as many litters containing sows suitable for breeding purposes had been finished to sell before it was known that here was a shortage of any kind.
