LONDON, Jan. 2.—The disparity in the oratorical strength of the two great parties was never more emphasized than to-night when Premier Asquith at Haddington, Sir Edward Grey at Embleton, John Burns and L. MacNamara at Battersea, Augustine Birreil at Bristol and Walter Runciman at Dewsbury urged the value of the budget and condemned protection. They
