(b) To increase or lower the percentum rate fixed by Section 10 of the Assessment Act for businesses enumerated in said section;

(c) To increase or lower the amount of exemption on income fixed by Clause 19 of Section 5 of the Assessment Act, and the amount so fixed as the value of any building, the rate percentum for business, or the amount of exemption on income, shall be adopted and applied by the assessment of buildings, business assessment, or assessment on income, and all assessments made in accordance with such bylaw shall be valid and binding as though such assessment had been made in accordance with the provisions of the Assessment Act.

(2) Any such bylaw may from time to time be amended or repealed, and the percentage or portion of the value of buildings, or the percentum rate for business assessment, or the amount of exemption on income, may be changed.

(3) In case a petition signed by five per cent. of the electors is presented to the Council sixty days before the annual municipal election, asking that the percentum of the assessed value of buildings, income and business, as set forth in the petition, be submitted to a vote of the rate-payers, then the Council shall submit the question to a vote of the rate-payers, and in case the majority of the votes cast are in favor thereof, then such percentum shall be adopted by the Council.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nme miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
