Volunteers Needed. But it is from the Hed Cross emer-gency branch at the city hall that the most cheering reports emaate. Yes-terday there were only 723 cases of in-fluenza and pneumonia under the city's care, compared with 752 on Thursday, and f32 a week ago. In spite of this encouraging news, the need for volun-teer nurses to aid stricken families is still acute, and their work will receive a decided set-back unless their ranks are reinforced. Twenty-one calls for assistance were received yest-arday, and nine of them were answered immediate-iy. Six volunteers were registered, and need the new cases. There have been no deaths from small-pox ;eported in the last 24-hours, and only three new cases have been brought to the notice of the authorities. MISS ANNE CILLICK






