OVER THE WIRES

About one hundred friends of Hon. W. H. Grimmer and Mrs. Grimmer called upon them last evening at their home in St. Stephen and presented them a set of gold silver knives and forks in recognition of their 25th wedding anniversary. James McAllister, a former resident of St. John, was killed at Grant, Montana, Nov. 11, by falling from a wagon, the wheels of which passed over his body. He leaves his mother, one brother and four sisters. Herman Thompson, who has been under arrest in St. Stephen for shortage in his accounts with the Singer Manufacturing Co., has been released, friends having advanced money to settle the shortage. WHEAT SHIPMENTS LARGE

LOCAL OPTION CAMPAIGN IN SYDNEY AND STANLEY WARDS

Social and Moral Reform Council so Decides—Other Important Matters Taken up at Meeting Here Yesterday

The Moral and Social Reform Council of New Brunswick decided at a meeting yesterday afternoon on a local option vote in Sydney and Stanley wards. The executive committee of the organization was instructed to wait upon the chairman of the liquor license commission to urge that steps be taken to have liquor inspected so as to check adulteration. Resolutions were passed calling upon New Brunswick's parliamentary representatives to have legislation passed at the present session defining the position of the I. C. R. in regard to the importation of liquor into Scotch act counties; and on the subjects of race track gambling, adultery and the social evil.

The honorary president, His Lordship Bishop Richardson, occupied the chair. Before assuming his seat he raised the point of whether it was advisable to have the representatives of the press present during the meeting. Archdeacon Raymond said that two-thirds of the business of the gathering could be reported. Personally, he had the greatest confidence in the discretion of the reporters, but the question of local option campaign was to come up, and some present might not feel at liberty to express themselves freely.

J. Willard Smith then moved that the representatives of the press be asked to withdraw. This was seconded and carried unanimously, and the reporters accordingly left the room. The following account of the business transacted was given out last night by the president, Rev. A. A. Graham.

Stanley and Sydney Wards

M. E. Agar reported on behalf of the committee appointed at the annual meeting to wait upon the government and present the drafts of proposed amendments to the liquor license act. The report of the executive was presented by Rev. Angus A. Graham, and its recommendations were considered. A slight amendment to the constitution was passed, and it was agreed to undertake a local option campaign in Stanley and Sydney wards, in this city, and the executive committee was appointed to carry out the campaign.

The recent decision of the supreme court of the province regarding the relation of the I. C. R. to the amendment to the Canada temperance act was brought before the meeting, and the following resolution was unanimously approved:

"Whereas, the House of Commons has passed an amendment to the Canada temperance act prohibiting the importation of liquor into counties where the said act is in force; and

Whereas, the Supreme Court of New Brunswick has delivered a judgment declaring that the Intercolonial railway and its servants acting under its instructions are not subject to the said amendment;

And whereas, a large extent of territory in this province is thereby deprived of the benefit which the House of Commons evidently desired to bestow upon all Scotch territory; therefore,

Resolved, that the executive committee of the federal government and of the New Brunswick members of the commons and senate be called to the fact that the evident purpose of the said amendment is defeated throughout all Intercolonial territory; and that they be urged to see that the original intention of the amendment be made clear by the necessary legislation at the present session."

The question of amendments to the criminal code was fully considered, and the following resolutions expressed the judgment of the council:

Race Track Gambling

Whereas the courts have interpreted the clauses of the criminal code bearing upon gambling and betting, in such a way as to make lawful the negotiating of bets by bookmakers and handbookmen, if done on the streets, or if done on race tracks, while they move about, but unlawful if they remain in any building, booth, or de-

signed place, thus making the law absurd; Whereas the states of New York, Alabama, Louisiana, Texas, Missouri, Illinois, California and Washington and many others, as well as Japan, have recently prohibited all such professional gambling, leaving Canada almost alone in legitimizing this vice, and making her race tracks the rendezvous of gamblers and other social parasites from all over the continent; and Whereas our people are in consequence being schooled in gambling and its attendant evils; therefore,

Resolved, that the Moral and Social Reform Council of New Brunswick strongly urges representatives in the House of Commons and Senate to use their influence to have enacted without delay such amendments to the criminal code, as will, under adequate penalties and by simple process, make pool selling, bookmaking and the business of gambling, clearly unlawful everywhere and under all circumstances, as well as the publication of information tending to aid in gambling, and in other respects to render the law effective for the suppression of gambling.

There, resolved that we, the members of the Moral and Social Reform Council of New Brunswick, assembled in session, strongly urge our representatives in the house of commons and senate to exert their influence to have the Criminal Code amended without delay so as to make Canadian society and morals against such a grave peril.

These amendments and resolutions were approved unanimously.

Tuberculosis

Rev. Hunter Boyd addressed the council on the War With the White Plague, and proposed the following resolution which was seconded by Rev. D. Lang, and received the hearty approval of all present:

"Whereas, the objects of the Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis are in harmony with the aims of the Council of Moral and Social Reform, this meeting cordially endorses the work of the said association in this province, and urges the members of this council to aid in removing the conditions which engender the disease known as tuberculosis."

The executive committee was instructed to wait upon the chairman of the board of license commissioners and urge upon him the necessity of steps being taken for the inspection of all beverages sold in licensed places, and further urge upon him the adoption of some method of inspection in virtue of powers bestowed upon the commissioners in section 22 of the License Act. Efforts are being made to prevent the adulteration of foods, but no attempt to guard against adulteration of beverages.

Bishop Richardson spoke of the alarming amount of profanity noticed upon the railway trains, and it was agreed to call the attention of the various railway authorities to the necessity of enforcing the laws against profanity on their premises and in their cars.
