A LONDON VIEW OF SITUATION

Meaning of the Advance in the Bank of England's Rate—The Foreign Markets.

The London correspondent of the New York Evening Post cables as follows: "Thursday's advance in the bank of England rate to 4 1/2 per cent, was primarily due to your market's financial position, and to knowledge that a high bank rate, in order to be effective against further American borrowings, must be imposed before the autumn commences. The rise would probably have been postponed for a fortnight, but for the fact that our own market was threatening to overwhelm the bank with bills at 4 per cent."

A GLOOMY VIEW

Edmund Randolph wired his Montreal office on Tuesday: "Many people regard their securities as capital in their hands. At any rate they are a basis for banking credits, and also of estimating surpluses of assets over liabilities. It is estimated that since December 1, 1906, the shrinkage in value of securities listed on New York Stock Exchange alone amounts to over five billion dollars. This amount is about three times as large as the National debt of the United States, and about equals the debt of Great Britain and the United States combined. A basis of credit too great for the mind to grasp has withdrawn itself from the business of this country. The result in our opinion must be a great industrial and commercial reaction."
