ACADANS TO HOLD GRAND CONVENTION

'Tis Expected Between Three and Four Thousand Will Be Present. Will Open at Caraguet on Tuesday—Moncton Y. M. C. A. to Celebrate Twenty-Fifth Anniversary—L. C. R. Employs Picnic.

MONCTON, Aug. 12 (Special)—The Moncton Y. M. C. A. will have reached the quarter of a century mark on the 25th anniversary of its organization in 1880 with a small membership and occupying three small rooms it has steadily grown until today the association has one of the finest buildings in the city. It is probable that the 25th anniversary of the association's existence will be fittingly celebrated.

Some three or four thousand people, delegates and others, are expected in attendance at the Acadan National congress to be held at Caraguet, N. B., on Tuesday and Wednesday, the 15th and 16th of the present month. The subjects to be discussed at the congress cover a wide range, embracing national interests. Judge P. O. Landry, of Dorchester, is secretary of the committee on subjects to be discussed. A special excursion train will be run from Moncton, leaving here on the 14th. It is expected that the Westmorland will send a strong delegation to the congress, as special efforts to that end are being put forth by those having the excursion in hand.
