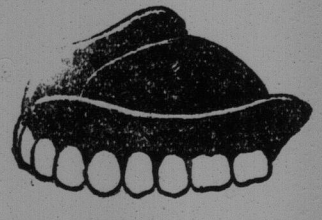

LATE LOCALS

The Canadian Order of Foresters, Court No. 267, will meet in Union hall this evening at 8 o'clock, and not tomorrow night, as has been stated.

Wednesday, April 10th has been fixed as the date on which the applications for liquor licenses will be considered by the commissioners.

C. P. R. steamer Montcalm, Captain Hodder, arrived in port this morning from Bristol, with five storage passengers and a general cargo. The steamer had a rough but uneventful passage.

A new forg alarm bell, weighing 1500 pounds, was taken on board the steamer Harbord today, at the Station on the N. Y. John Tennant will go down to place it in position for the Canadian government.

A number of boys made a daring attempt to steal some wire from the Union Depot last night. The coil, which was in transit, was lying on one of the express trucks when one of the lads picked it up and made off with it.

Professor John A. Nicholls, of Boston, will leave for the Hub on Wednesday to attend the annual session of the Massachusetts Grand Lodge, I. O. G. T., in Lowell.

Business was more brisk this morning in the vicinity of Indian town than it has been since last fall, many of the country folk, who were hemmed in during the winter having broken through drifts and come to town.

The Port of Spain Gazette of Port of Spain, Trinidad, in its issue of March 13, publishes the following account of an execution which took place there the previous day:

BIG FIRE AT INDIAN HEAD

Victoria Hotel, Valued at \$200,000, Almost Entirely Destroyed.

INDIAN HEAD, Sask., March 26 (Special)--The Victoria Hotel was almost entirely destroyed by fire yesterday, the bar and part of the furniture alone being saved.

It was the first fire since the new water-works system was installed, and the brigade did excellent work with new equipment.

POLICE COURT

James Quinlan was today fined \$20 or two months in jail for assaulting Joseph Hector, an aged colored man, on Haymarket square, yesterday.

Both plaintiff and defendant reside at Willow Grove, and Hector declared that Quinlan rolled him in the mud without the slightest provocation.

Arthur Cunningham, who was yesterday arrested by Policeman Thomas Burchill, on a charge of drunkenness and assaulting his sister, Miss Hattie, in her house in Foundry lane, was fined \$8 or thirty days in jail.

It appears that after indulging in alcoholics he went into the house and proceeded to break dishes and make matters generally interesting. When taken to the north end police station he was minus his coat, vest and hat.

William Whipple, charged with drunkenness, disorderly conduct and interfering with pedestrians on Charlotte street, was also fined \$8 or thirty days in jail.

N. S. GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION

Something About the Changes in Premier Murray's Cabinet.

(Halifax Chronicle.) Consequent upon the elevation of Attorney General Drysdale to the supreme court bench, the reorganization of the local government was completed on Saturday, when Hon. W. T. Pipes, commissioner of works and mines, was appointed attorney general.

Hon. W. T. Pipes, the new attorney general is one of Nova Scotia's strongest public men, and is a recognized leader of the bar. His career in the provincial arena dates from 1882, when he was first elected to the House of Assembly.

He retired in favor of Hon. W. S. Fielding, who then began his long career as premier of the province. Mr. Pipes was appointed a member of the executive and leader of the government in the legislative council in 1898.

On June 27th, 1905, he became minister of works and mines, and at the last general election Mr. Pipes stood for Cumberland and was elected to the house of assembly. In the department of works and mines, Mr. Pipes has proved himself an able and progressive administrator, who deals with all questions coming before him with impartiality and an eye single to what was best for the province and fair and equitable to all interests concerned.

Hon. Christopher Chisholm, the new commissioner of works and mines has been a member of the house of assembly for sixteen years and has been a member of the administration since 1902. He was born at Clydesdale, Antigonish county, in 1883, educated at St. Francis Xavier's College and called to the bar of Nova Scotia in 1905.

He was first elected to the house of assembly in 1902, and has since that date represented Antigonish county, in the legislature. He is recognized as one of the ablest and best-equipped members, as a platform speaker and a campaigner, of the house in Nova Scotia. As chairman of the important house committee on private and local bills for many sessions, Mr. Chisholm has shown a rare capacity to deal with difficult business questions, and in that position has had an important part in shaping much of the legislation that has been enacted in recent years.

Mr. Chisholm's acceptance of office will necessitate his going back to his county for re-election.

Mr. Chisholm is a member of the executive, has been in the house only two sessions, but he has already taken a foremost place as a debater and as one of the most useful and public spirited members of the legislature. In the committee of law amendments and other important work of the house, he has done excellent work, and in all his public service he has impressed the home and abroad with his good judgment and sane political wisdom.

His promotion to the government is well-deserved, as it will be popular, not merely in Western Nova Scotia, but throughout the province.

HOW THEY DO IT IN TRINIDAD

What Would An Up-to-date Canadian Reporter Think of This.

The Port of Spain Gazette of Port of Spain, Trinidad, in its issue of March 13, publishes the following account of an execution which took place there the previous day:

EXECUTION AT THE ROYAL GAOL. Within the precincts of the royal gaol yesterday morning, Chulisingh, a convict with his life, the murderer of Jinkah, of which he had been found guilty at the last sitting of the Port-of-Spain criminal assizes. Perhaps it would not be surprising to briefly recapitulate the facts of the case. Chulisingh and Jinkah had lived somewhat unhappily as man and wife on the "Santa Amelia" estate in Poole district. They separated several times, but on the morning of November 6th, 1906, were seen walking together in the direction of a shop. All traces of the woman were then lost, but shortly after, Chulisingh returned. It was only on the next day that the woman's body was found, most fearfully mutilated, near a cedar tree in a cocoa field, some distance from houses. At the time of his condemnation, he weighed 129 pounds, and at the time of his execution, he had increased his weight to 145 pounds. He was very gratified. He ate very heartily and several pounds. He was very happy and much cast down, but as the days wore on his appearance improved, and he admitted his guilt. He was but 25 years of age, 5ft 4 1/2 inches in height and was somewhat corpulent. A Hindu by religion, he was ministered to by Javani Pandit, a Brahmin priest, and died in his faith. His last request was for water which was given him, and having drunk, the necessary preliminaries were carried out, and at 7.08 a. m. he was executed. He appeared quite firm. Death was pronounced as being instantaneous. The executioners were Cairnes and Joseph, while the execution was witnessed by P. L. Fraser (superintendent of prisons), T. A. Thompson (marshal), H. L. Knaggs (justice of the peace), Dr. J. W. Eakin (D. M. O.), Javani Pandit (Brahmin priest), H. K. Collins (assistant supt. of prisons), J. Barrow (overseer), W. de Souza (assistant dispenser) and a few spectators. The body was ministered to by the statutory hour, was cut down and interred.

PORTAGE LA PRAIRIE, Man., March 26--(Special)--William Lyke, convicted for manslaughter at the assizes was sentenced yesterday to fifteen years in the penitentiary. He is an elderly man and this practically means a life term.
