TO SELL THE VIKING

BOSTON HEARS OF IT

Rev. Dr. Maguire of Ruggles street Baptist church has given the use of his church for a meeting of maritime province people some evening next week, before whom will be laid the plans for the soldiers' memorial church at Haymarket square, St. John. Besides the church building and vestry, it is proposed to have kindergarten, ladies' parlour, club room, kitchen, second-hand clothes room, social hall, reading room, gymnasium and swimming pool. ANDREW MYLES DEAD
