Famous Old Churches May Be Disposed Of

LONDON, Oct. 5.—Controversy has broken out afresh regarding the possible fate of the seventeen famous churches in the heart of London, built by Sir Christopher Wren.

A commission of four bishops has recommended that they be disposed of. The sum necessary to buy them, £1,000,000, is declared to be far beyond the reach of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners.

The Roman Catholic weekly, "The Universe," argues that if the Church of England can no longer maintain these churches, some of them be sold to other denominations and indicates that the Roman Catholics would not be adverse to taking over one or more of those historic religious edifices.
