

# RAILS LEADING UPWARD MOVE IN WALL STREET

Renewed Buying of Motors Features Activity in Industrial Groups

## MONTREAL MARKET IS QUIET BUT STEADY

B. C. Fish, Breweries and Laurentide Each Advance One Point

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The market for stocks continued to lead the forward movement of stock prices at the opening of trading today. Buying embraced New York Central, Union Pacific and Chicago and Northwestern, all of which scored substantial gains. Trading in the industrial groups was featured by renewed buying of the

motor issues, which carried Chrysler and Hudson up more than a point.

### QUIET IN MONTREAL

MONTREAL, Dec. 8.—There was very little activity in the early trading of today's stock market, but the tone was steady. The least active issues were B. C. Fish, up one to 60 1/2; National Breweries, the same, at 55 1/2; Laurentide, the same, at 85; Asbestos preferred, up one-quarter, to 115; Brazilian, unchanged, at 79 1/2. In extremely light trading Spanish River rose one-half to 102, as did also Canada Cement, to 100 1/2. Consolidated Smelters and Shawinigan were the only other stocks to appear in board lot transactions, and they were the same at 100 and 109 respectively.

### LIBERALS NOW HAVE 101 SEATS IN HOUSE

Bagot Added to List—Conservatives Total 117; Progressives, 24

Canadian Press.

TORONTO, Dec. 8.—The election yesterday of G. D. Morin, Liberal, in Bagot, brings the total of Liberal members in the House of Commons to 101, with 117 Conservatives, 24 Progressives, 2 Labor and 1 Independent. It counts or court proceedings in progress at Peace River, Alberta, and Huron North, Ontario, may alter standing before parliament assemblies on January 7. Morin was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the death of J. E. Maciel, Liberal. He defeated the Conservative opponent, Hon. Andre Fectoux, by a majority of about 473.

### ALBERTA PRINTING CONTRACT PROBED

Former Minister Was Partner in Company Mentioned in Inquiry

EDMONTON, Dec. 8.—The Royal Commission investigating the provincial government printing accounts for 1921, heard evidence yesterday respecting the relationship between the government of that day and the Camrose Job Press, Limited. Evidence was given that Hon. G. P. Smith, Minister of Education in the Stewart government, was a partner in the concern. Evidence was also taken regarding an agreement entered into between Mr. Smith and John T. Johnson another partner, by which Mr. Smith, on joining the provincial government, sold his interest in the concern to Johnson for \$1,700.

Mr. Johnson stated that Mr. Smith continued to draw two-thirds of the profits of the Camrose Job Press, after he took the provincial office, and that he drew these profits up to the time he left office in January 1922.
