

## Saxony Has Soviet Republic With Red Leaders as Advisers

Communists Approve All Acts of Socialist President and the Cabinet in an Always Radical State.


London, March 20.—(By mail).—The nearest approach to a Soviet Republic which Germany has yet permitted herself has been established in the former province of Saxony. The Saxons, even when a king, was very red, and since the revolution it has been a hotbed of extreme radicalism. This radicalism has compelled the united Socialist parties to accept the collaboration of the Communists, and, owing to some extent to the fact that the bourgeois parties could not agree among themselves, a government has been formed by advanced Socialists practically under the patronage of Communists.

With the support of the Communist members, the Socialists in the Parliament have elected Dr. Zeigner Minister-President, and he has formed a Cabinet of Socialist members, which meets with Communist approval. Dr. Zeigner is thirty-seven, and studied political economy and law at Leipzig University. Although he commenced his legal career only in 1918, he became Saxony Minister of Justice in 1920. Since then he has appointed many new and young men to important posts, and introduced a new spirit into the administration of justice.

Dr. Zeigner has to work with Communists, however, and some features of the Communist programme are an amnesty and pardon in full measure, the establishment of a chamber of workers, the combating of Prussian by the formation of pre-arranged defence organizations and the influencing of the administration of justice.

It is generally feared that the smaller but more active, more aspiring, and in agitation more vigorous and skillful Communist party will soon



## Canadians to Attend Col. Boyle's Funeral

Strange Romantic Figure Led Life of Adventure

London, April 17.—(Canadian Press Cable).—Prominent Canadians in London will attend tomorrow the funeral of Col. (Klondike) Boyle, who having crowned a life of adventure by

his exploits in the Great War, died at the home of a friend in Middlesex on Saturday.

The Canadian High Commissioner, who is on the continent, will be represented at the funeral, and a floral wreath will also represent the tribute of the Canadian Government. F. C. Wade, agent-general for British Columbia, will attend on behalf of his province, and will lay a wreath on the coffin.

Boyle's war decorations tell their own story of the Canadian's brilliant record. Among them are the D. S. O., five Russian decorations, the French Croix de Guerre with palms, and the Russian St. Vladimir and St. Stanislaus decorations, both with swords.

"A strange, romantic figure," says tonight's Evening News, in referring to Col. Boyle, "with the hard-bitten look of a man who all his life had made his own way. When the Bolsheviks refused to hand over sixty Russian prisoners, Boyle flew into a Bolshevik camp by French airplane, leaped into the boat occupied by the prisoners, without cap or baggage, and made the Russians take him with the prisoners to Crimea, where he persuaded the Russians to keep their word and release the Russians. Boyle returned in triumph to Bucharest."

Majority of Three in Rochester, N. H., of Middle Age

Rochester, N. H., April 20.—Statistics of the local evening school, just closed, show that Rochester had one pupil who was 62 years old and out of the total number of 60 pupils enrolled the majority were middle-aged. In the elementary department pupils studying the English language were distributed in age groups as follows: Under 21 years, 18; 21 to 30 years, 18; 31 to 40 years, 24; 41 to 50 years, 4; above 50 years, 1.


