OUR DOLLAR NOT AT PAR FOR SOME TIME IN STATES

What New York Bankers Say—Wall Street Journal on Exchange Situation.

New York, Nov. 16.—(Canadian Press)—Discussing the Canadian exchange situation the Wall Street Journal today says: Bankers attribute the recent weakness in Canadian exchange to the falling off in demand for Canadian funds in New York.

Bankers think it improbable that there is any connection between the recent rise in sterling and the fall in Canadian exchange. It is possible that Canada is buying sterling in New York, said a banker with Canadian connections.

This, of course, would cause a decline in Canadian funds proportional to the rise in the pound, since, as the pound rose in New York a larger amount of U. S. currency would be required to purchase a given number of pounds.

But I do not think Canadians are buying sterling as not very large at the present time, and could probably be satisfied without their having to enter the New York market.

"Most bankers are not taking any definite position on Canadian exchange, merely satisfying their requirements from day to day. One banker, however, said that he did not expect to see Canadian dollars at par for a considerable time, owing to the large amount of Canadian securities held in this country, and to the unfavorable condition of the Canadian trade balance at the present time."

Yarmouth, N. S., Nov. 16.—Considerable damage was caused to lobster traps along the south shore of Nova Scotia by a northeasterly gale last night. The steamer Northland, scheduled to sail last night for Boston, was delayed until this morning.

TRUSTEES CONVENTION

Fredricton, N. B., Nov. 16.—Some delegates have arrived here for the first provincial convention of school trustees, to open here tomorrow morning. Among those who have arrived is Mrs. McIverach of Isabella, Man., who will be one of the prominent speakers.

He has been appointed by the provincial government as arbitrator in the educational problems arising between the teachers and educational authorities of that province.

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STRIKES IN CANADA

Loss of time throughout Canada owing to strikes during September, 1921, or October of last year. There were carried over from September sixteen strikes, involving 2,229 workers and resulting in a time loss of \$4,704 working days, as compared with twenty-two strikes, 3,338 workers and 8,100 working days in September, 1921, and twenty-one strikes, 6,168 workers and 72,683 working days in October, 1921.

None of the strikes in progress during last October were terminated at the end of the month.

ST. ANDREW'S MEETING

St. Andrew's, Nov. 16.—Oils assumed dominant positions later under lead of the Standard Oil group. The New Jersey issue rose 1/2 points and the California shares 2%. Mexican Petroleum, General Asphalt, Freeport Texas, Houston and other group preferred were 1 to 5/8 points higher. On the stock exchange call money opened at 4 1/2 per cent and the lowest initial rate in three weeks, but in private dealings offerings at four per cent were liberal. Exchange on London was comparatively strong.

PLANS TO WALK FROM MONTREAL TO CALIFORNIA

Montreal, Nov. 16.—Arthur Mainville of this city, ex-service man, and moving picture operator and chauffeur, will leave on Monday next on a hike, which he expects will last a year, to Universal City, Cal. He intends to work his way across the continent and will leave here without a cent.

AUSTRALIA CUTS DEFENCE EXPENDITURES

London, Nov. 14.—(Canadian Press).—Reuter's Melbourne correspondent cables that the acting minister of defence, speaking in the Australian House of Representatives, announced that the government was reducing the expenditures on defence by £250,000.
