MORE OF OUR MEN EXPECTED THIS WEEK AT HALIFAX

Regina and Essequibo Bringing 189 New Brunswickers Home

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 17.—The steamer Regina from London, Dec. 12, is expected here on December 21 with forty-one officers and 2,089 other ranks. For Nova Scotia there are two officers and 268 men; for New Brunswick, two officers and 178 men.

The Essequibo is expected to arrive here on December 19 with thirty-six officers and 650 other ranks, together with six nursing sisters. The complement for Nova Scotia will be two officers and forty-four men and for New Brunswick nine N. C. O.'s and privates.

FREDERICTON PLANS MEMORIAL TO SOLDIERS WHO GAVE THEIR LIVES

Fredericton, Dec. 17.—The matter of erecting a permanent memorial to Frederickton to those who gave their lives in the war is to be considered at a public meeting. Public subscription would defray the cost of the monument.

This city has under consideration a scheme for the creation of a belt line of paved streets. Existing tar and concrete pavement in Queen street is to be repaired and used in this line and is to be connected with Charlotte street, which it is suggested be paved with tar macadam throughout its entire length.

FORMER GAGETOWN MAN HAS ARM CUT OFF

Falls Beneath Train—Though 60 Years Old, is Recovering

Fredericton, Dec. 17.—Word has been received here that Charles M. Lawson, a former resident of Gagetown, son of the late David Lawson, deputy sheriff and jailer of Queens county, recently fell beneath a moving train at Kalsipela and had one of his arms cut off.

Although more than sixty years old he is recovering.

Mr. Lawson went to Montana in 1880, with a large number of people from this province.

PRESENT FOR EVERY ONE OF CREW OF OLYMPIC

Halifax, N. S., Dec. 17.—Following presentations yesterday to Captain B. F. Hayes and Chief Engineer A. Ferguson of the Olympic, every officer and man in the ship's company was given a Christmas present of several useful articles.

The idea, originated with R. S. MacLaughlin, president of the Oshawa, Ont., branch of the Navy League and was carried out by F. L. Towke of the Halifax relief committee of Halifax. Upwards of 800 packages were distributed. Among those taking part in the proceedings was the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia.

THESE BOYS WERE TOO ROUGH IN THEIR PLAY

A North End boy, aged eleven years, still is suffering from the effects of rough handling received from some older boys in the course of what may have been intended as play. A show time ago, during the severely cold weather, the older lads stripped the little chap of most of his clothing, tied his hands behind his back and after some wild Indian antics finished the performance by rolling him down a hill. A severe cold, bruises and a serious shock to his nerves resulted. The matter came to the attention of the police but, on the request of the injured boy's parents that the older boys be given another chance, no action has been taken so far.

PUT YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS ON LETTERS YOU SEND NOW TO THE BOYS OVERSEAS

Ottawa, Dec. 17.—A telegram has been received by the militia department from Sir Edward Kemp, overseas minister, making a practical suggestion for the benefit of persons communicating with Canadian soldiers overseas during demobilization. It is pointed out that during this period, owing to the movements of troops and changes in organization, difficulties will arise in delivering postal matter. The suggestion is that "name and address of sender be clearly written on the outside of all envelopes or parcels addressed to members of the overseas military forces of Canada." This will facilitate the return to the sender of any postal matter which it may prove impossible to deliver. The public in Great Britain is being asked to take similar precautions.

THANKS OF PROVINCE TO BOSTON PHYSICIAN

Hon. W. F. Roberts Tenders It To Dr. R. J. Williams

Gave Big Help in Fighting Influenza on North Shore—His Opinions as to Danger of Renewed Outbreak

This morning at the office of the Minister of Health, Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, the minister formally thanked Dr. Robert J. Williams of Boston for two months of faithful service during the late epidemic of influenza in the Chatham and Blackville sections. It was a word of official recognition in which the people of New Brunswick most heartily concur, and the ex-Chatham boy will return to his duties in Massachusetts feeling that he carries with him the thanks of the whole province for help rendered at a time of direful need.

Doctor Williams had just finished a rigorous campaign against influenza in Boston, during the early fall when he came back to Chatham to visit his old home. No sooner had he arrived when the influenza assumed alarming proportions in this province. Although tired and much in need of recuperation, the Boston doctor started in again to fight the common enemy. That he was a valiant knight in his warfare, Hon. Mr. Roberts and the people of Chatham and Blackville readily attest.

The Times had a short chat with the returning physician this forenoon. Asked what he thought of the prospects of a recurrence of the epidemic, he said he did not think for a moment that there would be any serious fresh outbreak.

"It is only natural," Doctor Williams said, "that after so wide a sweep of influenza a few weeks ago there will be groups of cases cropping up here and there for some time to come. In fact I think we will have a running fight, a sort of rear-guard action with the influenza until next warm weather. We always have a running fight with some kind of disease, so this would be nothing unusual."

Doctor Williams is a firm believer in personal and individual responsibility for the spread of contagious troubles. Cleanliness, sensible care, and taking little ailments by the forelock are his mottoes. Then the public is automatically protected and no bans or hardships need be imposed upon anybody. He thinks the people have learned this lesson pretty well, too.
