pictures of sanitary conditions for a source of milk supply and side by side condition of St. John's milk supply. Methods of testing used are shown and described and there are on view some of the discs used when the sediment test was applied to St. John's milk. The booth is intended to emphasize the necessity of cleanliness, care and pasteurization.

Mrs. Gertrude Hasbrouck, child welfare expert from New York, who is to assist with the child welfare concourse, is addressing mothers' meetings in the afternoon in the Playgrounds Association building on the grounds. Her subjects are life beginning and adolescence; malnutrition and the care of the teeth.

Women's Work.

The Women's Institutes of the province have the largest exhibit of women's work they have ever shown. The department of agriculture has offered prizes totalling \$200 in value for articles exhibited by the institute members and the prizes go not to the individual members but to the institute which sent the article.

The children of the free kindergartens have exhibited a case of paper toys and among the toys a splendid circus is one of the big attractions. Another exhibit contains the work of children under fourteen years of age and the articles shown there are surprisingly good.

The main exhibit of women's work is the largest in the history of the exhibition, is more varied as to the kind of work and contains some articles to the making of which infinite skill and pains must have been required.

All along the end of the women's section is the electrical house exhibit. Through the co-operation of the Eastern Electric Company and of Manchester Robertson Allison, Limited, this exhibit was made possible.

The provincial government natural resources exhibit is around the corner from the exhibit of Waterbury and Rising and occupies the whole of the eastern gallery.

On the wetren gallery, F. A. Dykeman, of St. John, in a booth decorated with autumn foliage, is showing fall fashions for day, afternoon and evening wear and has gowns, silks, coats, gloves and novelties all in the latest fashion.

The Corona Candy Company in the western gallery has a very pretty arranged exhibit. It is a booth representing candy lanes where a candy house is set in a fairy garden with fountains, flowers and all made of candy.

The art exhibit this year is well up to the high standard of excellence reached by previous exhibitions. C. H. Fiewelling, Miss C. O. McGivern, and Miss E. Holt have arranged the collection, which consists of about 200 oil and water color paintings, in such a manner as to give great pleasure to the viewer.

Some of the paintings are by Montreal artists, some are loaned by Alexander Watson, H. A. Powell, Mrs. W. Carleton and Miss McGivern. Dr. H. S. Spangler has loaned a very valuable collection of copperplate etchings and the Art Club collection of paintings also is shown.

In the amateur exhibits for competition are some charcoal drawings, pen and ink sketches, photography, heraldic designs, book-binding and metal tooling, and china painting. F. G. Jones exhibits some examples of high class John Frodsham, of St. John, in his booth, exhibits Victorias and floor lamps and, what is something of a novelty, a Regina music box.

The Fiewelling Press has a booth showing samples of the firm's work in wood engravings, brass signs, brass memorial tablets, honor rolls, copperplates and letter heads, each of excellent workmanship.

The Anderson Rubber Company, of London (Ont.), has for inspection and sale all kinds of rubber goods for the nursery and the home.

The Provincial Memorial Home for Children has on exhibition a doll's sofa made by Thomas Arbo and a model yacht which was made by William Logan. These and several other tempting prizes are being raffled at the booth for the benefit of the home, which is urgently in need of funds. All of the prizes have been donated.

F. E. Holman, of St. John, has a handsome display of wall papers and pictures. A grass cloth paper, made from the bark of the Japanese honeysuckle, is a special feature of the exhibit.

The Empire Wall Papers, Ltd., of Montreal, have wall papers for inspection suited to ever yroom in the house from the drawing room to the kitchen. J. Clark & Sons, Ltd., exhibit Columbia gramophones, the Mason Risch piano and piano player and show the accuracy of the player's reproduction by comparison with the same piece played on the piano at the same time.

John, has charge of a large booth in which they serve King Cole Orange Peck tea at prettily arranged tables.

The Boy Scouts Association has made its booth "a nook in the forest." A camp fire which looks like the real article is the central piece in the scene and trees of every kind form the walls of the booth. V. C. Timberley and Mr. Riddle are in charge of the booth and the kiddie stand ready to render any service asked in any emergency.

Manchester, Robertson, Allison, Ltd., has on exhibition a Hoover Electric suction sweeper which is being demonstrated and its qualities explained.

H. Horton & Sons, of St. John, have a showing of trunks, hand bags, suit cases and leather goods of all kinds.

The Phonograph Salon, of St. John, has for demonstration various types of the Sonora phonograph and provides a fine concert programme. Piano lamps and small table lamps made in St. John are also part of this exhibit.

Simmons, Ltd., of Montreal, has a section devoted to the display of the beds which the firm manufactures. The beds have metal frames so stained and painted as to be indistinguishable from wood.

Day beds, Cots, cribs and couches are shown also.

Oak Hall, St. John, has displayed men's and women's ready to wear garments of excellent quality. Armour clad clothes for boys, guaranteed to stand wear are a big feature of the exhibit.

The exhibit of Manchester, Robertson, Allison, Ltd., is a delight to inspect. Enclosed behind the plate glass the firm has arranged three sumptuously furnished rooms and in the living room, in the centre three figures, presumably the mistress of the house and her friend and daughter. All three are beautifully costumed.

Their surroundings are not less elegant. The oriental rugs upon the floor, the wicker backed tapestry upholstered furniture, the cosy fire-place, each speak of comfort and enjoyment.

A small hall on one side and a perfectly arranged dining room on the other are both fitted with everything that could be desired.

Waterbury and Rising, Ltd., has a spacious exhibit of foot-wear for all occasions and for all ages. They show leather, felt and rubber boots and shoes.

A conspicuous feature is the Tweedie boot tops and buckles gaiters. A "K" English made suveyor's boot and large grey rubber fishing boots are other specially noticeable articles shown.
