### THE ELECTION CONTEST—CANDIDATES, &c.

Any one who has studied and retained the knowledge obtained at election contests, will be satisfied of the political deception practiced by men, who, apart from politics, are looked upon as models of uprightness, but who during an election campaign, do not hesitate to promulgate theories, which for years they opposed and condemned. The facility with which they can change their base is marvellous, and it is not surprising that their honied phrases and sophistry mislead those who either lack the ability or from the nature of their employments have not time to study the political issues of the day.

Of late years it has been the practice to have a hobby, often an unworthy one, to effect a change of administration, or perhaps, to retain men in office. This is not confined to any party, but practised by all. It is true that all do not see alike, and were the people left to exercise their own judgment, it is very probable different results would follow.

The canvass of the Opposition is based upon "protection" (which means taxation) and a "national policy." Well, they are entitled to their opinions and to express them, and also to elect men if they can, who will oust the government, of which however, there appears no prospect.

In this County, the friends of Mr. Gillmor and Mr. McAdam are sure their men will be elected—and the candidates themselves share the same feeling, which we suppose is natural—but there is sure to be disappointment somewhere; and to add to the difficulty, Mr. Donohue, a former representative, is again a candidate, and it is said that Mr. Mitchell, of St. Stephen, is also seeking the suffrages of the electors. Still further, requisitions have been signed inviting Mr. Grimmer to offer for the Dominion Parliament. This makes a quintet of candidates to select from; and it is said political activity is growing more intense as the weeks pass on.

Meanwhile Mr. Gillmor is quietly pushing his canvass throughout the County, and receiving assurances of support which will warrant his return again to Parliament. Wire pullers and log rollers have more faith in their own powers than the mass of the people believe, and the ballot box will show, who is the man of the people. It is not possible to be neutral in politics, and we honor the man who is not afraid to express his views in a pronounced manner and maintain them—whether he be friend or opponent of the government.

THE RAILWAY MEETING held in Stevenson's hall, on Monday evening last, was more largely attended than usual on such occasions. The Sheriff was chairman by general request, and Mr. Magee, secretary.

The chairman explained the objects of the meeting,—to receive the report of the Committee appointed at the meeting held on the 29th December last, and to adopt measures to secure the running of the daily trains. Mr. Magee, secretary to the committee read the report, which was received and adopted.

Several persons then addressed the meeting, and a motion was put and carried—That a committee be appointed to meet and confer with the Railway Directors, with a view of arriving at an amicable and satisfactory arrangement of the difficulty.

The following persons were appointed: Messrs. A. T. Paul, J. R. Bradford, Capt. Robinson, R. Ross, H. H. Hatch, D. Clark, J. E. Magee.

Mr. Osburn, Manager of the Railway, having entered the hall at this stage of the proceedings, was informed what had been done, and invited to give his views, which he did at some length. He stated that it was the first opportunity he had of meeting the gentlemen of St. Andrews, connected with the present enquiry, and he was happy to have the opportunity to give reasons for the stoppage of the daily trains, and read the traffic returns, showing the falling off in the traffic on the St. Andrews end of the line, and gave other information with reference to the railway.

In reply to the question "how soon would

it be convenient for the Directors to meet and confer with the Committee," he said Monday next, at the Railway offices, St. Stephen, a conference could be held, which was accepted by the committee.

Hon. Mr. Stevenson addressed the meeting at some length, and stated that he was a Director and stockholder in the railway, and declared that he had nothing to do with the stoppage of the running of the daily trains—as had been erroneously circulated some time ago.

Mr. Bradford moved that the Committee meet the Directors at the time named, and report the result of the conference at a meeting to be held here, on the 26th inst. We took notes of the speeches, but believe the interest of the community will be best served by giving this brief notice.

The Hon. A. Mackenzie, Premier, and hon. Cartwright, left Ottawa yesterday, to visit St. John and Halifax. It is probable they will deliver addresses, and wipe out the Opposition dust so lavishly sprinkled on the people, from the "Protection" causers.

The Town Pic Nic held yesterday in Mowat's grove yesterday, was a pleasant affair, and gave great satisfaction to those who attended. The day was very fine and persons from various parts of the County were present; the number on the grounds being about four hundred. The committee received commendations for their excellent arrangements.

According to announcement, the Hon. Mr. Tilley addressed a number of people in Stevenson's hall, on Thursday evening last. Mr. W. D. Hart was chairman. As the speech was mainly a repetition of his address in St. John, which has been published in the daily papers, it is not necessary to publish our reporters notes.

THE ELECTIONS it is generally reported, will be held the last week in September.

Colonels Strange, Maunsell, and Macshane were here last week, to determine the site of a battery. They also inspected the men of the Battery, and complimented them on their progress. Capt. Boileys may be proud of his men.

We are pleased to notice that Kennedy's Hotel is being largely patronised. Upwards of eighty guests were registered within the past ten days, the house being full for some weeks. The large amount invested by its proprietor in fitting up a first class hotel, appears to be an investment appreciated by the travelling public. Among the guests at the hotel, are the following:

THE DOMINION MONTHLY for August has a nice selection of interesting articles. The article on "The Daily Newspaper," is a minute description of the Witness Printing House, with twenty engravings illustrative of the process of newspaper production, from the setting of the type to its sale by the newsboys at the street corners. The Witness was started as a weekly in January, 1845. After some years it became semi-weekly, and in 1860, on the visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada, a daily was commenced as an experiment. It became rapidly popular, and from hundreds its circulation soon grew to thousands. The other publications issued from this office are the Northern Messenger, a semi-monthly commenced in 1865 under the title Canadian Messenger; the New Dominion Monthly, started in 1867, the year in which Canada became a Dominion, and L'Aurore, the only French Protestant paper in America. In all more than seven millions of papers are printed in this establishment during the year, and while in 1860 the weekly pay list amounted to \$80 paid to sixteen employees, it now amounts to \$925, paid to one hundred and twenty eight employees.

For the young folks, in addition to the serial, there is "Helen Morley," the story of the successful struggles of a little girl to overcome her selfishness.

In the Home department are two good stories, and also literary notices.

Lord Beaconsfield in responding to a toast Saturday evening, said that by the convention with Turkey England's responsibilities were diminished, not increased. He brought back from Berlin the conviction that neither the Crimean nor the last war would ever have occurred if England had spoken out firmly. Repelling the assertion of Mr. Gladstone that the Turkish convention was an insane convention, Lord Beaconsfield spoke of Mr. Gladstone as "a sophistical rhetorician inebriated with the exuberance of his own verbosity and egotistical imagination." Most people would say that Disraeli was better described by those words than Gladstone.

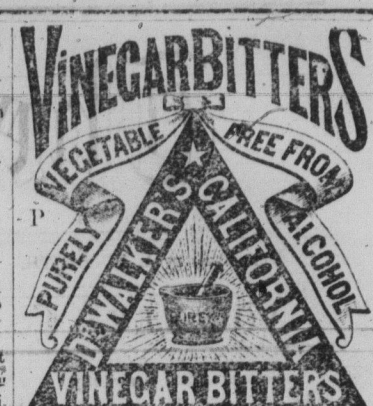
