Home Bank, Canada.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 3.—Acting up-
on the instructions of Hon. W. F.
Nickle, Attorney General, police offi-
cers were at noon today equipped
with warrants to bring into custody
President H. C. Daly and several
members of the Board of Directors
of the defunct Home Bank of Cana-
da.

Later it was reported that F. C. B.
Russell and Casey Wood, directors,
and D. G. Smith, Chief Accountant,
of the Home Bank had been put un-
der arrest and that officers were on
their way to arrest President Daly at
his summer home on Lake Simcoe.

REPORTED MISSING BUT SAFE

Grave concern and interest was
manifested on Wednesday last when
it was reported that Leonard Snow,
of Shearstown, was missing from
his home. The young man, it ap-
pears, left his home Friday morning
and in company with another man,
went to Coley's Point to engage in
spreading fish on Long Beach, he
being one of the crew of the sch.
Exotic. The young man Deering
went on board the vessel while Leon-
ard went to his grandmother's at
Black Duck Pond and complained
of feeling unwell. About noon he
and Deering left to go home, part-
ing at Country Road. No concern
was felt until some time Sunday be-
cause it was thought by his friends
that he remained on board the ves-
sel. Search parties scoured the coun-
try side between Country Road and
Shearstown in the rainstorm on Mon-
day and Tuesday thinking he had
grown faint or stumbled and hurt
himself, but their search proved
fruitless. Snow was reported to have
been seen by a man near Jack's Hill
going towards Whitbourne. On
Wednesday a message was received
from Little Harbor, T.B., saying that
Leonard Snow had reached there
Saturday and was staying at his
mother-in-law's.

His Excellency Sir Wm. Lamont
Allardyce, Knight
Commander of the
Most Distinguished
Order of St. Michael
and St. George, Gov-
ernor General and Commander
(L.S.) in-Chief in and over
the Island of New-
foundland, and its
Dependencies.

Whereas it has been represented
by the Importers' Association
other persons engaged in Bank-
and Commerce, that they have
been unable to assign certain days as
days to their employees;

and, whereas it is desirable that
certain days, as hereinafter men-
tioned, should be proclaimed as Public
and Bank Holidays;

do therefore, by this my Procla-
mation, order and direct that the
following days be set apart and ob-
served, throughout the Colony, as
Public and Bank Holidays, viz:—

September next;

Monday, the Second day of July
next;

Wednesday, the First day of Aug-
ust next;

Wednesday, the Twenty-second day
of August next;

Wednesday, the Fifth day of Sep-
tember next;

Friday, the Twenty-fifth day of
September, 1924.

Wednesday, the Thirteenth day of
February, 1924.

Monday, the Seventeenth day of
February, 1924.

Friday, the Eighteenth day of
February, 1924.

Wednesday, the Twenty-third day
of April, 1924.

Which all persons concerned are
required to take due notice
of, and to observe accordingly.
