### BIG SALMON RUN BEGINS IN STRAITS

Between Sixteen and Eighteen Thousand Fish Lifted in the Todd Munise Traps.

Mr. Daykin, lighthouse keeper at Carmanah, reports the Straits full of salmon this morning. Large numbers of whales, seals, blackfish and porpoises are in sight, evidently in pursuit of the fish.

Following on this announcement comes

the news that between sixteen and

eighteen thousand salmon were lifted in the four traps operated by Messrs. Todd Munise.

This is the largest individual catch of the season so far reported in the Straits, and it would appear that the big run to which all cannery have been looking forward has at last set in. This means increased activity at the cannery in Esquimalt, and a busy time on the Fraser, where the major number of the institutions in the province are still located.

In addition to the lift made by the firm mentioned the Capital City Cannery & Packing Co. was to raise the salmon in their traps this morning, but the result of this catch has not yet been learned.

The effect of the success of the traps in the Straits has been stimulating and exciting. Canneries are said to be rushing back and forth along the coast, catching the majority of the fish, and following the line of traps as they pass from sea with the cannery tides. New trap locations are being sought, and it is important to those reeling them that they know the exact courses of the salmon.

In the Fraser the fish were yesterday said to be running fairly well.
