
. EDWARD CHAMBERS.

tion about a week ago, broke up last night. HONG KONG, Feb 4—The total cost of repairs to str Monteagle is \$34,500. BOSTON, Feb 18—Sch Helen J Seitz, before reported wreck at Long Beach, NJ, struck an old wreck, losing stern post and keel. Her sails, running rig-ging, windlass and boiler were saved. A ten gallon can of gasolene under the forecastle head exploded on Saturday while the material was being removed, setting the wreck on fire. The men aboard escaped uninjured. She was valued at \$120,600 and uninsured. Slop Whip, with scrap iron from a warship being demolished at Point of Pines, was cut through in Mystic River by ice on Thursday and sank. Barge Girard, from Philadelphia for Boston, hröke adrift from tug Valley Forge and went ashore at Highland Light this morning. Captain Larsen and Seaman Burke saved; two drown-ed. The barge is entirely broken up. Barge Alaska, which the tug also had in tow, went ashore on Peaked Hill Bar and has broken up. Her timbers are washing ashore. It is supposed her crew of four are lost. Barge Beth-ayres, another of her tow, is reported going ashore on Peaked Hill Bar. 
