

Crippen and Typist Sent Up for Trial

Defence Did Not Show Hand at Preliminary Examination and Hearing Ends in Committal.

London, Sept. 21.—At the close of the police court proceedings today, Dr. Hawley H. Crippen and Ethel Clare LeNeve were committed for trial charged with the murder of the doctor's wife, Belle Elmore. Solicitor Newton reserved his defence for the trial proper.

London, Sept. 21.—Ethel Clare LeNeve was hooted and jeered at today by a crowd of men and women that awaited her arrival at the Bow street police court.

The trial of Miss LeNeve and Dr. Hawley H. Crippen for the murder of the latter's wife is drawing to a close and this fact probably accounted for the accused girl, through the streets to the police court yelling their opinions of the typist as they chased along. When the vehicle stopped in front of the court building a crowd in the thoroughfare hooted wildly. Miss LeNeve held an open umbrella and was fairly successful in escaping observation as the police made a way for her.

Financial Affairs.
The financial affairs of the Crippens were gone into today in line with the prosecutor's assertion that the doctor at the time of Belle Elmore's disappearance was pressed for funds and that the death of the woman was to the monetary advantage of the husband.

The manager of a bank testified that Mrs. Crippen notified the institution on Dec. 15, 1909, of the withdrawal of a joint account which she and Crippen had kept there.

Miss Merion Currow, an employe of the Munyon people who succeeded Crippen in the management of their local office testified that the poison alleged to have been purchased by the doctor and traces of which were found in the mutilated body was not used by the company. She added, however, that Crippen frequently bought drugs for his own preparation.

The witness said that during February when Crippen told her that his wife had gone to America and died there, she cashed for him several checks one for \$500. She last saw the doctor on July 9 when she gave him the money on a check for \$185. This was just before he disappeared and at the same time he said to the witness—

"If anyone inquires for me you are to know nothing. Say nothing." Before this Crippen had left several packages with the witness saying:—"If anything happens to me give these to Miss LeNeve."

started to repair it, but he never reached the place he started for. When up about ten feet he fell to the deck, striking on his head and, according to a statement made by the captain, died almost instantly. His skull was crushed in and it is thought his head struck a bolt which was in the deck just where he fell. The unfortunate man belonged to Shelburne, being a son of Mrs. Jehro Hardy, and was 25 years of age. He had followed the sea for several years. When home as a lad he was well liked by his friends for his genial manner and his tragic death is deeply regretted. The funeral took place at Shelburne, being conducted by Rev. Alfred Lund, pastor of the Methodist church.

OBITUARY.
Wm. C. Fleming.
His numerous friends and acquaintances, not only in this city, but throughout the province as well, were shocked yesterday to hear the news of the death of Wm. C. Fleming, which occurred after a year's illness at his home, 182 St. James street.

Mr. Fleming was one of the most widely known conductors of the C. P. R. in this section, and was a popular favorite with all who knew him, numbering among his friends people of almost all ranks. For twenty-seven years he was in the employ of the C. P. R. He had been ill for about a year with Bright's disease.

Mr. Fleming was a son of the late John Fleming, who will be remembered as one of St. John's leading citizens a few years ago. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Anna Fleming, three brothers and three sisters, his wife and one son, Harry, at home. The brothers are Thomas, of Fredericton; John, of St. Stephen; and David, of Syracuse, N. Y. Mrs. C. D. Perkins, Mrs. F. L. Potts and Mrs. E. J. Gorman, of Boston, are the sisters.

The funerals will take place on Friday at 2:30 o'clock and members of New Brunswick Lodge K. of Pas well as sister lodges in the city, will attend. The two local companies of the uniform rank will also attend. Mr. Fleming having been a member of Cygnus Co., No. 5.

NEW BISHOP OF RHODE ISLAND FELL 70 FEET TO HIS DEATH

Rev. J. DeWolf Perry, Of New Haven, Conn., The Choice— Bishop Brent's Name Was Before Convention.

Providence, R. I., Sept. 21.—Rev. James DeWolf Perry, Jr., rector of St. Paul's church, New Haven, Conn., was chosen bishop of the Episcopal church of Rhode Island to succeed the late Right Rev. Wm. N. McViekar, by the special convention of the diocese late this afternoon. It required seven ballots to secure the required majority of the clergy.

The election of Mr. Perry was a complete surprise to the people of the state, as his name had never been mentioned as a candidate. When the convention began balloting early in the afternoon about 20 names were submitted. When the first ballot was taken Dr. Fiske, Rev. Dr. Leighton, rector of St. Bartholomew's church, New York, and Bishop Chas. H. Brent of the Philippines, were the leaders.

Bishop Brent's name was then withdrawn by Rathbone Gates, who said that the Bishop felt that his work was in the missionary field. The other candidates in the order of their vote were: Rev. Dr. Alexander Mann, rector of Trinity church, Boston; Dean George Hodges, of the Episcopal theological school, Cambridge, Mass.

Mr. Perry is a low church man, while Dr. Fiske is of the high church faction, and it seemed one time that there would be a deadlock between the clergy and laity over this question, as the former favored Dr. Fiske, and the latter early united on Mr. Perry. This is the second time Mr. Perry has been called to this diocese, having been asked to become rector of Grace church when Rev. Dr. Rousmaniere resigned to go to Boston.

KEEP SECRET NAMES OF THOSE SELECTED BOY SCOUT MEMBERS
Nominating Committee Wait to Submit Report to Public Meeting --- No Provincial Council Just at Present.

At the meeting of the nominating committee of the boy scout movement held in the board of trade rooms yesterday afternoon a local association was nominated, but as it was intended to submit the names of the members selected to a public meeting to be held early in October for ratification, they were not given out.

The nominating committee decided not to name a provincial council at the present time. It was considered inadvisable to attempt to form a provincial council until the movement had developed locally. Accordingly an effort will be made to build up a large association here and then extend it to other towns.

A meeting to formally launch the new association will be held early in October, when Capt. Birdwhistle will be here to assist in the work of forming local patrols.

Alles E. Agar, who was elected chairman of the nominating committee, stated at the close of the meeting that the reason the idea of forming a provincial council had been abandoned for the present was that they did not care to select members until they knew whether or not the men looked upon as likely leaders in the movement were prepared to serve on the council. If other towns took up the matter and organized local branches then it would be an easy task to select a provincial council from those active in the local organizations.

Among those present at the meeting were M. E. Agar, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Dr. H. S. Bridges, W. H. Moor, Major Thomas Klockham, Messrs. C. B. Allen, T. H. Estabrooks, James F. Robertson and J. N. Harvey.

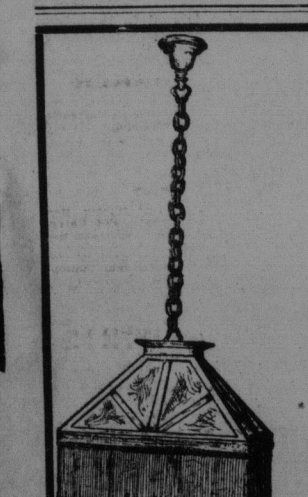
