

NOTED PRIEST PASSES AWAY

Rev. Phileas Bourgeois, C.S.C., Died at St. Joseph's University - Yesterday Afternoon - Was Noted Historian.

St. Joseph's, April 3.—By the death of Rev. Phileas Bourgeois, C.S.C., which occurred at St. Joseph's University, this afternoon, the province loses a noted educator, an able writer and historian and well known citizen.

The late Father Bourgeois was born at St. Joseph's almost within sight of the university where he passed his youth as a student and to which he devoted his life as priest and professor. His early studies were made at St. Joseph's University; later he went to the province of Quebec to prosecute his ecclesiastical studies.

As a priest the deceased was held in esteem by the clergy and revered by the students who had the privilege of his friendship. His death will be regretted by present and past students of St. Joseph's, many of the former being St. John graduates.

Continued from page one. The conservative government's attitude was that while it had every confidence in the loyalty of the government of Japan, nevertheless, the final resort would be the authority of the government of Canada.

In his closing words Mr. Borden made it unmistakably clear that Mr. Pugsley had taken the opposite view to that held by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Lemieux, and stated that in every respect the Government were safeguarding the interests of the Dominion.

The discussion was continued all evening, speeches being made by Messrs. Carver, Stevens, MacDermott and Oliver, and the bill was reported from committee at 11:45. It stands for third reading tomorrow.


The jury retired at six o'clock, and after returning twice for instructions failed to agree after four hours deliberation. The jury was discharged and Colpitts was required to enter into a recognizance and a bond for \$500 to appear at the next sitting of the court if required.

On Thursday morning the case against George H. Prosser, charged with breaking, entering and stealing goods from the store of Frank Graves at Parkdale, on the night of May 15 last, was taken up. The Attorney General prosecuting, and George Fowler, K. C., and Uzz King for the defence.

Mr. and Mrs. Graves were both called and testified that on the date mentioned their store had been broken into and the goods stolen. George A. Barry, an accomplice of Prosser, was the next witness, and swore that he had assisted in the burglary under Prosser's direction.

On cross-examination Barry was shown to have a bad character, and admitted himself a peddler in such cases. He also had been guilty of theft and larceny.

Inception of Business Venture which may Develop into General Transport and Taxi-cab Services.

What its promoter hopes will eventually develop into an important business, has been established in St. John by W. G. McGinley. Mr. McGinley has a handsome and well equipped automobile on the streets, operating under the name of The Pneumatic Parcel Delivery Service. The first car made its appearance on Monday, and already has been much in demand. He expects to put another car on about July 1st and a third in the autumn. Later it is the intention to put on trucks for the delivery of heavier articles, machinery, etc., and if business warrants the experiment a taxi cab service will also be operated.

DR. ANGUS J. MURRAY DIED YESTERDAY

Well Known Fredericton Junction Physician Passed Away after Lengthy Illness—Had Long and Honorable Career

Special to The Standard. Fredericton Junction, April 3.—Dr. Angus J. Murray passed away at 1 o'clock this afternoon at his residence here, after an illness extending over some months.

He had been in poor health for a year, suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis, and had been bedridden since the day before last Christmas. Dr. Murray was born at Loganville, Pictou county, Oct. 29rd, 1855, the eldest son of John and Nancy Murray. He received his early education in the common schools of that time. His high school education was obtained at Pictou Academy and the Provincial Normal School. He taught school for several years in various parts of Nova Scotia.

During his career in Sunbury, he was for six years a member of the municipal council and for two years warden of the county. In 1909 he was elected president of the New Brunswick Medical Society, an honor which he esteemed very highly, as he was the first country physician to obtain the distinction. He was also a member of the provincial board of health, a member of the I. O. Foresters, and a member of the Fredericton Society of St. Andrews. He was a lifelong Conservative.
