MARINE NOTES  
OF THE WORLDLARGE GRAIN SHIPMENTS  
AT PORTLAND.Icebergs Off Grand Banks—  
Seamen Scarce in New Eng-  
land—New Furness Liner  
—Steel Tug Commissioned.

## GRAIN AT PORTLAND.

About 50,000 bushels of grain have been unloaded at the No. 1 Grand Trunk elevator, Portland, Tuesday and Wednesday, and the receipts for the balance of the week are likely to be very heavy, as two steamers are expected here within a few days to take out cargoes aggregating over 500,000 bushels. The first to arrive will probably be the Daley, which was expected to leave St. John, N.B., yesterday and should reach here on Saturday. The other steamer, the Carlton, is expected to follow her about two days later. The charters of two or more additional steamers will probably be announced in a few days to take on cargoes later in the month.

## DODGED MANY ICEBERGS.

After dodging many icebergs off the Grand Banks, 47 bergs and growlers being sighted on May 1, the White Star liner Arabic reached Boston on Monday from Liverpool via Halifax. Some of the bergs sighted were of enormous size, the steamer giving them a wide berth. When the steamer started from Liverpool she had 1394 passengers all told, 1379 of them being landed at Halifax.

## ADDITION TO FLEET.

The Knickerbocker Towing Co. of Bath has just added another boat to their fleet, the steam tug Reliance having arrived at Bath from New York, and will be employed on the Kennebec river during the summer in command of Capt. A. Quinn.

## U. S. INSPECTION SERVICE.

The United States Department of Commerce has approved certain changes in rules and regulations governing the steamboat inspection service made by an executive committee of the board of supervising inspectors. A new regulation adopted permits practical experience on a motor boat to count in an application for a license or a raise of grade on ocean going or coastwise steam vessels. Formerly this applied only to steam yachts.

## NEW FURNACE LINER.

Yesterday the new Furness liner S. S. Digby was due to sail from Liverpool for Halifax via St. John, N.B. It is understood that the Digby will, during the summer season, run between Halifax and Liverpool, calling at St. John's both eastbound and westbound. In the winter she will probably maintain a direct service between Liverpool and London. The Digby will have accommodation for 40 first and 30 second-class passengers.

## SAILORS IN DEMAND.

Sailors are exceedingly scarce at the present time at all the New England ports and some vessels have been considerably delayed in consequence.

## DOING WELL IN BAIT.

Herring were plentiful at Amherst, Grandstone and House Harbor, and Etang du Nord Tuesday. There were plenty of herring in the traps at Grand Entry. John A. Dillon, fishery officer at Quacoquet, said yesterday that no herring had been found during the day.

## MARITIME MISCELLANY.

U. S. Supervisors boat Cerberus, Capt. Bell, while on patrol two miles SE of Scotland lightship at 5 p. m. yesterday, discovered tug James A. Garfield in distress, having lost her propeller. The Cerberus towed her into South Brooklyn, Philadelphia, May 6.—Canadian Anthony, belonging to Delaware River Lightage Co. containing about 360 tons of coal, sank this morning off Camden, N. J.—San Francisco, Cal., April 30.—Schr Ruby, hence 26th for Coquille River, carried today with foremast head carried away, will repair.

Steamer Berwindmoor reports May 2, about 10 miles SE of Fenwick Island lightship, passed a black can buoy marked "35" in white. Steamer S. V. Steamer Victorian reports April 24, lat 28 42 N. lon 75 06 W, passed what appeared to be a derelict about 200 feet long bottom up. Steamer Gulfport reports May 3, Alligator light bearing WSW and W, about 17 miles distant, passed a piece of new timber about 40 feet long and 12 inches square. Steamer Aureole reports April 29, about 13 miles S by W of Dry Tortugas, passed through a great quantity of heavy balks of timbers from 20 to 50 feet long and 20 inches square. Steamer Ramona Head reports April 22, lat 35 23 N. lon 54 47 W, passed a large black buoy marked "No. 18" with a mooring ring on top. Steamer Aras reports April 26, lat 40 N. lon 55 10 W, passed a log about 40 feet long and 2 feet square covered with marine growth.
