The matter of patriotic display  
cards on the street cars was brought  
up and arranged satisfactorily to  
comply with the Street Railway Com-  
pany.

The chairman announced the fol-  
lowing meetings to be held on Thursday  
evening: One in St. Peter's Hall,  
North End; one in Fairville, and one  
in the Opera House at which Prof.  
Falconer of Halifax will speak.

A. M. Belding reported that a piano  
had been acquired in the Mill street  
office and had been paid for by the  
committee.

The chairman reported the result of  
the letter to Col. Fowler. The reply  
contained the fact that Col. Fowler
