## MAKING MUSIC INTERESTING

The study of music from the very beginning should be made interesting and thorough, even the child can be made to play with expression in her own atmosphere and by degrees the study will become a source of real pleasure and inspiration to him or her. What we need is teachers all over the country, who know fundamental technique according to correct principles and can teach that there is no need of "beginning over again," because the foundation was badly laid, if such a student should enter the classes of an artist teacher.

If you want to choose an artist teacher for your girl or boy, be sure that he or she is thoroughly prepared and then choose one teacher who is an educator. In order to conquer the technical side of piano playing one has to learn a positive technique, and this positive technique consists of a thorough drill in trills, scales and chords, arpeggios and octaves. A painter would not begin to teach a pupil landscape painting, without giving the pupil first a thorough drill in drawing. In the same manner a piano teacher should not begin to teach a pupil compositions without first giving him a thorough drill in technique and touch, to strengthen the fingers and make them trustworthy and dependable. Practice at the piano should not be a mechanical "tattling off" of exercises by the hour or by the number of repetitions. The student should bear in mind that a mental supervision is absolutely necessary, in order to see that the hand is held correctly and that the fingers move in the right way.

Breakfast—Oranges. Fried cornmeal mush with cheese and pimientos. Toasted crumpets, syrup. Coffee.

Luncheon—Baked eggs au gratin. Boston brown bread and butter. Lettuce. Stewed rhubarb.

Dinner—Barley broth and rice. Creamed haddock, hashed brown potatoes, buttered beets, warm rye ginger bread with fruit sauce.

Two Wheatless Menus. Breakfast—Steamed cereal with Johnny cake, baked potatoes in skim milk, hot Johnny cake, butter, coffee.

Luncheon—Veal kidney stew, cold Johnny cake, baked potatoes, sliced oranges.

Dinner—Vegetable soup, broiled halibut steak, parsley potato balls, canned tomatoes, fruit salad.

Breakfast—Grape fruit, cereal, scalloped cod fish, potato cones, coffee.

Luncheon—Braised lamb's liver with salt pork, southern (soft) Indian meal cake, preserved apples with lemon and spices.

Dinner—Clear tomato soup with tapioca, hot lamb, turnovers with potato crust, baked onions, Indian pudding with cream.

STANDARDIZATION OF  
P.E.I. RAILWAY URGED

Delegates from Charlottetown and Summerside go to Ottawa to Plead for Broad Gauge System to Save Freight Transfer.

Charlottetown, April 14.—Delegates from Charlottetown and Summerside boards of trade and from both parties in the legislature have gone to Ottawa to urge standardization of the gauge of the Prince Edward Island railway. They argue that it is essential as a war measure to forward produce from the island. Last season the railway failed to grapple with the situation under present conditions and with a presumable increase of 75,000 acres of cultivated crops this year the need is more urgent than ever. The annual cost of transferring freight to narrow gauge would pay the interest on the amount required to widen the road.
