Faithful Lady Teacher Resigns

The Public School Board have received the resignation of four lady teachers. Three of these were accepted and accepted last evening, namely, Miss Grace Master, Miss Hilda Bowman and Miss Myrtle Betzner.

The fourth, Miss Annie Scully, also resigned but the Board owing to her long length of service in this town, 31 years, took no final action at this meeting.

Prosecution's Witness Was Not Present

Several cases in which the License Department claim that there were violations of the O.T.A., were disposed of in police court this morning. Mr. James A. Haverson, K.C., counsel for the defendants enter a plea of guilty to charges of selling liquor.

In the one case the defendant was Mr. George Reinhardt and in the other case Mr. Charles Bruder. The fines were \$200 and \$400 respectively.

A similar charge by the Department against Mr. Joseph Zuber was adjourned until this afternoon at the request of Mr. Jeffrey, K.C., the counsel for the prosecution, who were hoping for the arrival of one "Ballantine," of Stouffville, supposed by the prosecution to be a helpful witness.

Says There is an End to Fairness

"There is an end to fairness," this remark by the prosecuting attorney Mr. N. Jeffrey, of Guelph, brought a retort from the counsel for the defense, Mr. James Haverson, K.C., in police court this morning.

Mr. Haverson, owing to not being able to have his witness here in the case of the License Department, versus his client, Mr. Charles Zuber, for selling liquor, pleaded for an adjournment after Mr. Jeffrey had secured an adjournment until three o'clock this afternoon of another case against another defendant. Mr. Jeffrey maintained that the matter had already been adjourned three times at the request of Mr. Haverson. This statement also was challenged by Mr. H. J. Sims, one of the defending counsels, who said that Mr. Jeffrey himself had asked for an adjournment. This was admitted by the prosecuting attorney.

The result was that both cases were adjourned until 3 o'clock this afternoon.

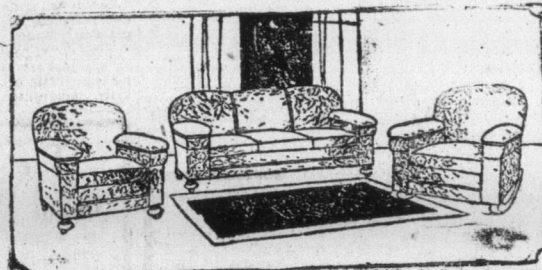
