WHITE, PETER. (North Renfrew.)

Of Scottish descent. S. of the late Lieut.-Col. Peter White, who settled at Pembroke, 1828. B. at Pembroke, Ont., 30 Aug. 1838. Ed. there. M., Dec. 1877, Miss Thompson. A lumber merchant, and a dir. of the Pontiac and Pacific Junction Railway Co. Has been Reeve of the Tp. and Town of Pembroke. An unsuccessful candidate for present seat at g.e. 1872, and in Nov. 1873: Sat from g.e. 1874 until 14 Sept. same year, when unseated on petition, An unsuccessful candidate at the election which followed. Re-elected 26 July 1875, on Mr. Murray being unseated. Re-elected at g.e. 1878, and again at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Pembroke; Rideau Club.

WHITE, THOMAS. (Cardwell.)

Father emigrated to this country from Co. Westmeath. Irel., in 1826, and carried on business for many years in Montreal as a leather merchant. B. in Montreal, 7 Aug. 1830. Ed. at High School, Montreal. M. in 1853 Miss Vine, of Quebec. Was engaged in mercantile pursuits in early life, and subsequently studied law for four years with Hon. Sidnev Smith, Q.C., Cobourg. Served in Peterboro' and Hamilton as mem. of Grammar School Boards; was for some time Reeve of Town of Peterboro'. Representative for a number of years of the Montreal Bd. of Trade in the Dominion Board; member for three years of Ex. Co. of Dominion Board, and representative for five years of that body at the National Board of Trade of the United States. First returned to Parlt, at g.e. 1878. Was an unsuccessful candidate for S. Wentworth in 1867 for the Leg. Assem., Ont.; for the Commons in Prescott Co. Ont., 1874, and for Montreal West in 1875, and again in 1876, the aggregate majority in the first three elections being only sixteen. First returned to Commons for present seat 1878, re-elected at last g.e. A Conservative. Thinks the Tariff should be so framed as to promote foreign trade by Halifax in winter, and the St. Lawrence in summer, as against trade by American seaports: and as to foster the development of the agricultural, mining, and manufacturing interests of the country. In favour of an Imperial Zollverein which would strengthen the bond of union between the Mother Country and the Colonies, by fostering and protecting their trade relations. 5 Beaver Hall Square, Montreal.
