Don Metz, former outstanding hockey player with the Toronto Maple Leafs was among graduates of No. 4 LT.S., presented with their "props" by Hon. J. C. Bowen, lleutenant-governor at a ceremony Thursday afternoon, Metz gave up a commission in the Canadian Army to transfer to the aircrew service of the R.C.A.F. about one year ago. He had been a second lleutenant, Metz left the Leafs in 1942 to enlist. Under command of Wing Cmdr. E. G. Macpherson, officer commanding the school, the graduating flight and other personnel of the school were lined up on the lawn in front of the Normal school building for the ceremony. The band at No. 4 LT.S. was in attendance and the lieutenantgovernar tork the salute on the march past after the presentation.

## **Mirmen Graduates** Are Given Props

Another class of airmen graduated Thursday afternoon at a ceremony and parade at No. 4 I.T.S. Hon. J. C. Bowen, lieutenant - governor, presented the "props" to the graduates. Under command of Wing Cmdr. E. G. Macpherson, officer com-manding the school, the parade consisted of the graduating class flanked by rows of airmen who have not yet finished their course. ## Shook Hands

Each man in the graduating flight was called out, marched to the front, saluted, shook hands with the lieutenant-governor, and received his "prop."

After the presentation, the lieutenant-governor took the salute on a march-past. Others on the saluting platform were: Wing Cmdr. Macpherson, Flt. Lt. L. R. Pocock, adjutant; Sqdn. Ldr. R. Fournier, officer commanding the graduating class, and Maj. C. V. Dacre, A.D.C. to the governor.

With an average of 94.4 in his final examinations at the school, Cpl. Thomas A. Black, of Vancouver, who has previously served overseas, was the "top honors" man of the class. He received a gold identification bracelet.

Formerly a second lieutenant in the Canadian army, LAC. Don Metz, famed hockey player with the Toronto Maple Leafs for many, years, was among the graduates. He transferred to R.C.A.F. aircrew and gave up the army commission about a year ago. Last time he played with the Leafs was in the winter of 1942.

"Let's Not Slacken" The governor praised Canada's three fighting forces and said "even if victory does appear to be closer now, let us not let up any effort or slacken until the last shot is fired."

LAC. H. G. Williams, 9321 98A st., was the only Edmontonian among the graduates.
