The land has been alienated by the issue of a Patent from the Reserve and forms no part of it, and therefore, it is beyond the control of this Dept.

I should be glad to know more in regard to Mrs Sinclair's having been permitted to share in the annuity of the Band notwithstanding the fact that she had shared in Half-breed scrip. I do not say that she is not entitled by virtue of her marriage to a treaty Indian to share in annuity; but I think it is questionable whether she was so entitled or whether any claim that
